FINE RECITAL.

Last Wednesday evening at the studio of Miss Edna Larson, on Central avenue, Mrs. Mayme Stanley-Gidley presented in song recital her pupil, Miss Esther Josephine Johnson. Miss Johnson is gifted with a splendid contralto voice of unusual range and power, in a program embracing a wide variety of songs, from such ambitious numbers as "The Erl King," "Eye Hath Not Seen (from Gault's Holy City)," and Dudley Buck's "Sunset," to the tender ballads from Cadman's Song Cycle; "The Morning of the Year," the young singer displayed an interpretive ability and taste and gave evidence of an adequate reserve power, which would have done credit to a more experienced artist. In these respects, as well as in her excellence of tone production and clearness of diction, Miss Johnson's work evidenced conscientious study and careful and capable training. She responded to insistent encores with "My Laddie," a "Serenade" and "There, Little Girl, Don't Cry." Miss Edna Louise Larson's accompaniments were notably good, being played with a technical precision and an appreciation of the singer's moods which ably supported her work.

Miss Mabel Harrigan contributed a pleasing violin solo, "Blue Bells of Scotland," with variations, and responded to an encore with Elekhn's "Wiegenlied." Miss Harrigan continues to show marked improvement in her work, and is a most promising young musician. She was capably accompanied by Mrs. Effie Mae Farringer at the piano.

Miss Clara Isabel Myren rendered two well-played piano selections, "Murmuring Zephyrs" (Jensen-Niemann) and Grieg's "Auf der Berge" giving Friml's "Valse Romantique" as an encore number. Miss Myren's playing is always pleasing and she was at her best, particularly in the Grieg number, which offers no little technical difficulty.

At the close of the recital delicious fruit punch was served, and the guests enjoyed a pleasant and informal half hour in conversation and congratulation of the artists.
