Hane's Machine Runs Into Dredge Pipe.
A taxicab, the property of J. E. Haney, was somewhat damaged when it crashed into a section of the pipe on South Fourth street laid by the Seattle dredge last Wednesday evening. The damage was paid by the dredge company who were at fault, no light being on the pipe line to mark the place where the vehicles should cross.
