SUPPLIES FOR RAILWAY WORK

Frederick Barbound at Astoria With Cargo—Eugene Line Progresses

EUGENE, Or., March 30.—The guard says: A barge load of railroad building equipment consisting of two steam shovels, four dump cars, six locomotives, four or five miles of track and a large amount of hay, grain and camp supplies is now held at Astoria, storm bound on the barge Frederick, and will be shipped to Porter Bros. Grant Smith Company at Glenada as soon as clear weather sets in.

The work on tunnel No. 7, seven miles south of the crossing of the Umpqua River, is reported to be progressing rapidly and 1850 feet of the tunnel is now completed.

The MacArthur-Perks Company, which has the contract for the grading on this line, has begun the shipping in of men to fill up the line camps as soon as they are put in shape. Yesterday eighty-five men were brought down from Portland and sent out to Mapleton. The MacArthur-Perks Company has made arrangements with the Southern Pacific Company for the transportation of these men and on Mondays' Wednesday and Fridays an extra coach is brought down on south-bound train No. 13 from Portland to Eugene for the use of these laborers.

ROAD IS CHANGED

County Surveyor Gould says he finished locating a new road from Cooper Bridge, three miles above Myrtle Point, on the North Fork, to Dora, a distance of 14.7 miles, where it connects with the Coos Bay wagon road. This with the new road surveyed last year around the Cooper hill, makes practically a water grade road from Myrtle Point to Dora. With the recent improvements on the Brewster grade it also gives much easier access to Brewster valley than ever before. In laying out the new road from Cooper bridge to Dora the distance was diminished about a mile and a half.—Coquille Sentinel.
