PEOPLE YOU NEW SCHOONER NEADLY DONG **NEARLY DONE**

Gasoline Boat for Coos Bay-Siuslaw Run to be Christened "Florence."

The new gasoline schooner which Kruse & Banks are building for plying out of Coos Bay, will be completed in about two weeks and will soon be put on a regular five-day schedule between Coos Bay and Florence, with possibly a few trips to the Umpqua between times.

The new boat is practically same size as the Rustler with the exception that it is about two feet deeper in the hold and will have a capacity of about 100 tons, while the Rustler carries only between sixty and seventy tons.

The new boat will probably be christened the Florence, in honor of the principal port of the Siuslaw to which she will ply. Capt. Peter Olson has been considering christening her the Alpha, in honor of his niece, a sister of Capt. Skog, who will command the new vessel, but since it has been determined to put her on the Siuslaw, it has been practically decided to call her the

The new vessel will cost between \$10,000 and \$12,000 complete. One of the engines of the Wilhelmina. which was lost at the Siuslaw a cou-ple of years ago will be put in the

Capt. Skog, who will command her, was formerly mate on the Breakwater, and for the past two years has been on the Elmore line boats, the Tillamook and Patsy principally

It is planned to put the Rustler exclusively on the Coos Bay-Port Orford and Coos Bay-Rogue River the same company handling both boats. Besides Messrs, Olson and Skog, Mr. Peterson has an interest in the new boat. Capt. Olson will

remain on the Rustler.

The Rustler has been waiting in the lower bay for a week for northwest winds to set in so that she could take her cargo to Port Orford and discharge it. The cargo has to be put in small boats since the wharf there was swept away. Capt.
