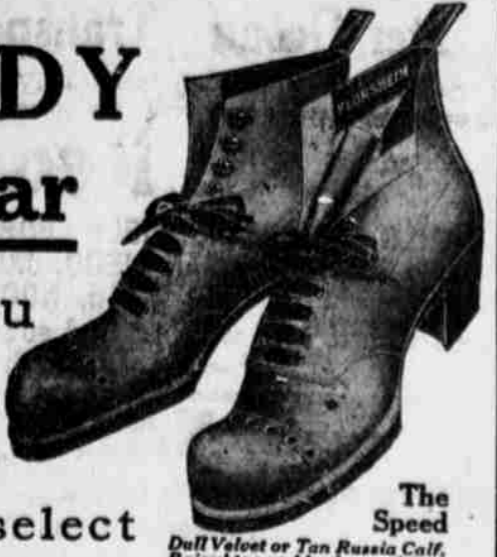

Taken Home.—A. Pettyeff, who was mysteriously injured the other night near the Coal Bank Inlet drawbridge, recovered sufficiently to be brought to his home on South Broadway yesterday and is being cared for by his wife, who is a nurse. He is able to talk and walk but has not told anything about the affair, his physician insisting that he be kept quiet lest excitement render him an imbecile for life.

Railroad Men Coming.—E. V. Hauser, of Hauser & Hauser, who have the contract for the Coos Bay end of the work of the Eugene line, Swan Benson and A. O. Peterson, are expected here today overland. They are walking over the route from Gardiner and sent their baggage by stage.

Witness Leaves.—Chas. Franklin, the negro porter of the Chandler barber shop, has suddenly disappeared and no one knows where he went to. It is understood that he skipped out so that he would not have to appear as a witness against his wife before the grand jury next month. She is in the county jail on the charge of having shot at \$25. Franklin received a rebate of \$25 from the city of the fine he paid for her and this was returned to another named Smith. Franklin was not under bond for appearance and his absence will probably result in the woman being released.

To Use Alder.—Secretary Motley, of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce has received a number of sample clothes pins made out of red alder from the Government forester at Portland. He says these are the first made of the wood, birch and beech being used hitherto and says that tests have shown the red alder is good for this, matchwood and other uses. He says that utilizing it will be a boon to Oregon, as the red alder is found on the lowlands and hitherto has been a dead waste and expense for clearing.

Expert Here.—J. C. Costello, chief engineer of the California Trojan Powder company, is here to spend a week or so with H. J. Vaughan of the A. B. Daly company, who represents the firm in this section. Mr. Costello will give a number of demonstrations on the use of powder while here. He made seventeen trips to the Panama Canal to demonstrate the use of high explosives there. He was recently at El Paso and while there met General Villa, who is leading the Mexican rebels and who was then at Juarez. He says that Villa is a bloodthirsty leader and when Costello saw him Villa asked for suggestions as to the cruelest way in which he could execute the perpetrator of the Cumbre Tunnel disaster, as he then expected to capture him soon.
