Manager McCredie, of Portland, has announced his probable lineup and batting order for the first game to be as follows:

Doane, rf; Davis, ss; Rodgers, 2b; Ryan, cf; Kores, 3b; Lober, lf; Derrick, 1b; Fisher, c; Higginbotham, p.

Roscoe Fawcett, in summing up the showing of the Portland bunch in the practice games up to Friday says:

"Husky Elmer Hanson has been the baffling sensation of the Portland camp so far in the campaign. While the San Bernadino giant has pitched in only four Spring games, his batting average is up to the stupendous height of .625.

"Bill Rodgers, Gus Fisher and Walter Doane likewise have been going at a tremendous clip. In six games the doughy captain has averaged .416 and Doane, in seven, .392. Doane was the big star against the negroes and Kores against Chicago, with two screeching safeties.

"Buddy Ryan, Bill Speas and Fred Derrick appear to be the only regulars off in their hitting. Ryan's average in six games has been only .222, but nobody who has seen Buddy whang the sphere around the lot is worried a bit. Had Buddy been getting the breaks in luck on his line drives his average would read close to the .300 mark.

"In the last game against the negroes at Watsonville Bud nearly tore the cover off the ball every time he faced the pitchers. The first baseman leaped up and knocked down one of his shots with his gloved hand, but Bud came back afterwards with a creaming triple and a home run over a 350-foot stockade.

Perkins' Showing.  
"Haworth and Perkins, the two kid catchers, appear to be fair hitters. Neither likely will beat .250 this year if kept, but Perkins, particularly, takes a nice cut and ought some day to blossom into a .300 biffer. Perkins in the five games that he has been tried out has been at bat sixteen times and got four hits, giving him a batting average of .250."
