EUGENE, Or., April 1.—A 60-room summer resort hotel, will be built at Westlake, on Tsilcoos Lake, EUGENE, Or., April three miles south of Glenada, this summer, according to an announce-ment made by C. K. Whiteaker and others of Portland. Construction on the first unit of the hotel, which will contain twenty rooms, will commence at once.
