BIG OREGON TIMBER DEAL

Iowans Sell \$200,000 Tract Near Medford to Wisconsin Men

MEDFORD, Or., April 1.—The John S. Owen Company, of Eau Claire, Wis., has purchased from Ernest E. Hart, incorporated, and the Ernest E. Hart estate of Council Bluffs, Iowa, 5849 acres of timber land in the Butte Falls district for \$200,000. The timber is principally sugar and yellow pine and Douglas fir, and lies along the Pacific & Eastern railroad and its projected extension. Agreement of sale and deeds to property involved, including mills, sawmills and box factory at Butte Falls and Medford, were filed for record.

IMPORTANT TAX CASE IT COURT

Lane County Decided Portland Ruling Didn't Apply There.

EUGENE, Or., April 1.—A temporary restraining order to prevent the treasurer of Lane county collecting over \$600,000 before September without penalties was granted by Judge Coke in the circuit court as the result of a complaint filed by the First National Bank of Eugene representing the taxpayers of Lane county. The order means the saving of \$30,000 in penalties which could be imposed if all took advantage of the payment of one-half the taxes now and the other half in September as in previous years.

GO TO CHURCH MOVEMENT.
DETROIT, Mich., April 1.—"Go-to-Church Sunday" was observed in this city Sunday and many outside towns and villages voluntarily connected themselves with this movement. An active campaign was carried on, consisting of the distribution of buttons, advertising on street cars, on billboards and in newspapers, house to house canvasses and the general use of the telephone by a "telephone squad." The campaign was well received and ministers of all denominations report that their congregations were far greater than those usually in attendance.

MAY PUT UP RESORT HOTEL

EUGENE, Or., April 1.—A 60-room summer resort hotel, will be built at Westlake, on Tellico Lake, three miles south of Tolenada, this summer, according to an announcement made by C. K. Whiteaker and others of Portland. Construction on the first unit of the hotel, which will contain twenty rooms, will commence at once. Mr. Whiteaker leaves Portland for the Siuslaw on April 2 to direct the work on the hotel and also the construction of a cottage for his own use.

According to the plans announced the hotel will be one of the most modern along the seacoast resorts of Oregon, and will be in line with an extensive scheme for a summer resort on the lakes south of Florence. The lumber for these buildings and several cottages has been contracted for and is being delivered by the Martin sawmill at Ada.

Captain H. G. Campbell has the steamer "Charm" which will be used as a pleasure boat on the lake, ready to launch in Portland, and she will be towed to the Siuslaw next week by the steamer Oakland. From Florence the boat will be transferred overland to the lake. The boat will operate between points on the lakes, including the railroad and the outlet to the ocean. The boat is capable of handling eighty passengers. With this ship Captain Campbell will establish a fleet of small boats for the lakes.

H. Baughman, of Portland, is contemplating the erection of a general merchandise store at Westlake.

DIES AT FLORENCE

Lafayette Boring died after an illness which has kept him confined to the house about six months. Mr. Boring who for many years has lived on the Siuslaw and until about a year ago resided on the island, moved to Florence last year to make his home with his son, Harry Boring, until his death.—Florence Pilot.

FLORENCE ENJOYS A BOOM

The Eugene Guard says: Florence, the metropolis of the western part of Lane county, is due for a boom this year in building, according to the statement of George Schroeder, former proprietor of the Seaview Hotel, and W. H. O'Kelly, a real estate broker with the Harbor-Sound company of this city and Florence. Mr. Schroeder and Mr. O'Kelly, accompanied by their wives, arrived in this city from Florence and will go to Portland, where Mr. Schroeder will complete arrangements for the building of a new, up-to-date hotel in Florence early this summer.

Mr. O'Kelly says that William Kyle and Sons have just finished a two-story business block, and will build a moving picture theater in the near future. The Lane county bank of Florence will put up a new bank building and Mr. O'Kelly will probably put up a two-story business block this summer and several smaller structures are contemplated in the downtown section of the city.

Porter Bros.' sawmill will start as soon as the barge Frederick, which is now storm bound at Astoria, arrives with some mill machinery. All of the lumber on hand at the mill was shipped out on a vessel for San Francisco today and it will be necessary to run the mill night and day to keep ahead of the orders now piled up.
