The question as the the quality and kind of paving to be used in the pavement of Sherman avenue at North Bend is causing considerable discussion among the North Bend city officials and others. City Engineer Andrews of North Bend, the one who first suggested wood block pavement, still says that in spite of the collection of abotographs that G. B. Datson as submitted for the consideration and inspection of Sherman avenue property owners, showing places where the wood blocks have been used for from four to six months under restricted traffic conditions and have fallen to pieces under the strain of a few light vehicles. These photographs are on exhibition at the North Bend Chamber of Commrece,

The question as to the manner in which the final estimates for the paying of Sherman avenue will be handled is not known, but it is presumed that tentative bids will be recaived, thereby giving all parties in-terested in different kinds of paving an opportunity to compete. point out that the asphalt paving would answer all the purposes that bitulithic would if hids are asked for from these companies, thereby laying the matter on a competitive basis under the specifications of the city en-

Simpson's Protest.

The Simpson Lumber company has refused to accept the plans of the North Bend city council for the grad-ing of Sherman avenue to the bridge at Simpson's park, through notification received by the city attorney recently. A strip of land which is being used by the city at the present time as Sherman avenue, from the ball park to the bridge, has never been dedicated to the city as a public lighway and the Simpson Lumber company, taking advantage of this fact, has refused to allow the grading.
