Mail Late.—Owing to the mail stage breaking down, the incoming mail from Roseburg did not reach Marshfield until about 11 o'clock today.

Postpone Meeting.—The meeting of the Lutheran League, which was to have been held tonight, has been postponed indefinitely, owing to the Willamette Glee Club concert.

Circulates Petitions.—Petitions of A. T. Morrison, mayor of Coquille, for the Democratic nomination for state representative from Coos county are being circulated here today.

Hurt Today.—A workman named Christ had his hand quite badly crushed by a timber falling on it today. He was working on the Southern Pacific crew that is building the line through the Smith yards.

Drain Fill.—Workmen are digging a drain to carry off the water from near Fourth and Golden via the old drain under Broadway and east to the Bay. In the meantime, South Broadway is suffering from the water.

Water Troubles.—Owing to the break in the Mill Slough drain box, a large portion of the district west of Tenth street is under water. J. W. Hillstrom states that his pasture and hayfield have been badly damaged and it may cause him to quit his dairy.
