HOW TO GET RID OF FLIES

Oregon Agricultural College Experts Explain Means of Handling Pest

COVALLIS, Or., April 2.—While
it is much better to keep the flies
out of the room than it is to exter-
minate them after they have en-
tered it, unfortunately it is not al-
ways possible to do so. When filthy
premises, either our own or our
neighbors, breeds swarms of flies
on hot summer days, some of them
are almost sure to find an entrance
into the rooms no matter how care-
fully guarded. When this unfor-
tunate condition is present, and it
is desirable to rid the house of
flies that have come in without
waiting for the action of sticky
paper and poisons, the following
treatments are inexpensive and ef-
fective:
1. Heat a shovel or similar
utensil, and drop into it 20 drops
of carbolic acid. The vapour will
destroy the flies in an ordinary
room.
2. Burn some pyrethrum pow-
der (insect powder) in each room.
This will stupefy the flies so that
they may be swept up and burned.
3. Dissolve 1 dram of chromate
of potash in two ounces of water
and add a little sugar. Put in
shallow dishes and place about the
house. A few drops of formalda-
hyde placed in a small quantity
of sweet milk is very effective when
placed about the house in shallow
dishes.
The foregoing directions are tak-
en from the twelve page pamphlet
recently prepared by the Entomolog-
ical Department of the Agricultural
College on "How to Conduct a Fly
Campaign."

CURE PNEUMONIA WITH SERUM.

NEW YORK, April 2.—As the re-
sult of experiments begun last fall a
new serum has been cultivated and
will shortly be announced to the me-
dical world. Out of 100 pneumonia
cases, treatment by this discovery has
been successful in ninety of them.
The serum is made from the blood of
a horse into which has been injected
pneumococci germs. It is injected
intravenously and relieves pneumonia
by bringing about a crisis in from
twelve to eighteen hours. Physicians
of the Rockefeller Institute are en-
deavoring to find some means of de-
veloping the cultures without the use
of a laboratory, so that this remedy
can be used generally by physicians.
