A CLEVER BANDING OF COAT AND SKIRT MAKES FOR NOVELTY

Odd touches mark many of the new gowns and suits this season, such as an effective girdle or a smartly designed vest or a shaped trimming band on coat and skirt. In this instance both costumes show novel touches. On one there is a surprise vest with pointed ends extending below the girdle. The other suit shows a coat gathered into a shaped band at the bottom and a similar band at the bottom of the skirt. 8011 shows several other smart features, among them a peg-top skirt, a drop-shoulder and an effective collar. Black velvet is the material used, with the vest and trimming bands of Roman striped faille. The girdle is of black satin. NEW FACTORIES, IMPROVEMENTS AND ENTERPRISES THAT INCREASE THE PAYROLLS AND PROMOTE THE DEVELOPMENT OF OREGON

SALEM, April 6.—A creamery has been secured for Heppner, but the packing house has been dropped for the present.

West Salem has a fruit and vegetable evaporating plant ready for business.

Cottage Grove is within a few hundred dollars of having a cannery.

In many counties legislative candidates are pledging themselves to enact no more laws to interfere with industries or business.

Caples & Co. are erecting a two-story brick general merchandise store at Forest Grove, 66x70 feet.

Astoria will erect the first unit of a half million dollar public dock.

The Toledo Lumber company resumes operation of its sawmill and logging camps.

Over twenty persons are already employed, besides the Commissioners, at \$3600 per year on the new Workmen's compensation act. \$8000 capital stock.

D. A. Paine will erect a two-story concrete warehouse at Eugene.

One of the latest Oregon industries is a sugar of milk factory that utilizes the whey from the Tillamook cheese factories.

The Eugene school board will go ahead with plans for a high school, authorized by the people, in spite of threat of referendum.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange will erect a warehouse at Hood River to handle this year's crop.

Salem postoffice is to have a \$40,000 improvement.

\$10 per week is to be the minimum wage in Washington, while in Oregon it is \$9.25 for Portland, rest of state, \$8.25.

German Reformed Lutherans will erect a \$10,000 church at Salem.

A \$50,000 Girls' Industrial school

and a \$27,000 implement building for the Feeble Minded Institute are to be built at Salem.

April 1st work started on the Willamette Pacific tunnel at Schofield creek.

The new State Fair pavilion is to cost \$44,700.

Permits for fifteen houses were taken out at Eugene during March, and Bandon has a strong building movement.

The Petzell Estate has built and is operating a sawmill across the river from Stayton.

Wm. Parker of Santa Maria, Calif., will establish the Royal Bakery at Roseburg.

The Savage Tire Co., the first automobile tire factory on the Pacific coast, has established a branch at Portland.

The Sutherland Brick & Tile Co. will operate with \$10,000 capital.

R. D. Hoke has been given a free site and may establish a cannery at Medford.

J. H. Fitzhugh of Coburg has moved a broom factory plant to Eugene from Lewiston, Idaho.

LaGrande is trying to locate one of the Heinz pickle factories.

The marble quarry on Williams Creek, owned by C. B. Perkins, of Portland, is being developed.

The North Bank road will erect a temporary freight house in East Portland, and promises an \$800,000 structure later.

C. L. Holliday will have a cheese factory in operation soon at Langell, Klamath county.

Portland men will erect a 65,000 capacity sawmill at the mouth of the Toulle River.

Eastern Oregon newspaper men met at Pendleton and discussed ways of promoting industrial development on Saturday, April 4.

Astoria is putting on a strong campaign to secure the use of wood block for pavements in that city in the future.

The use of Oregon building stone and opposition to further legislation against industries will be the two slogans at Eugene, May 9.
