## MISS MEREEN NOT ALARMED

Troubles of Some Students at Smith College Frightened Her Relatives

The following from the Berkeley Gazette will be of interest here as Miss Mereen's father, Arno Mereen, and brother, Jack Mereen, are both in Marshfield now:

"While many of her classmates have become terrorized at a series of robberies on the campus of the college and have left for their homes in various parts of the country, Miss Edith Mereen, an attractive Berkeley student at Smith's College at North Hampton, Massachusetts, has refused to allow the disturbances to interfere with her studies and will remain in the east to continue her work.

"Details of the robberies at the eastern college have been received here. The mystery which has been surrounding the crimes on the campus has been cleared, however, by the confession of Edward Warnock, a 16-year-old youth, who has admitted his responsibility for the robberies. Warnock, in his confession to the police, admits holding up a number of the college girl classmates of Miss Mereen and a member of the faculty at the point of a gun.

"Alarmed by reports of the state of affairs at the college, relatives of Miss Mereen telegraphed east last night and received a reassuring answer this morning that Miss Mereen had escaped the trouble. Miss Mereen is the daughter of Arno Mereen, of 2701 Benvenue avenue and is well known in local society."

Officer Doane examined the surroundings and discovered a large calabash pipe between the teeth of the young messenger, who was puffing vehemently and was very indignant on account of being disturbed by an officer of the law.

"It was only by the merest chance that I did not turn in an alarm," said Officer Doane in discussing the matter. "That Bohrer lad is only seventeen years of age and the law does not give him the privilege of smoking."

Officer Doane said that some steps ought to be taken to prevent the sale of narcotics to minors, and in all probability he will appear before the council this evening and request instructions as to what action he should take in similar cases where youths are smoking in Marshfield at present.
