PORT ORFORD OFFERINGS

Northern Curry County News as Told by the Tribune. Considerable of the freight that was landed here last week by the Randolph was damaged by sea that broke over the vessel as she was crossing the Coquille bar.

The past week has been one of cold, blustery March weather. Saturday was one of the most disagreeable days of the season, and Sunday wasn't much better. On the former day the cold wind blew out of the south west and thunder showers of hail and sleet were frequent, and a steady rain prevailed nearly all day, observer J. D. Loucks reported a 2 1-2 inch precipitation.

FIGURING RAIN

Curry County Seat Events as Told by the Globe.
