ANVIL COMES BACK.

Vessel Wrecked at Florence Overhauled at Portland.

A Portland paper says: Overhauling work is under way on the gasoline schooner Anvil, lying at the O. W. P. dock. She will resume service between Portland, Yaquina Bay, Stuslaw, Coos Bay and Bandon in about two weeks. Except for a test run, following repairs, the Anvil has not been in service since she stranded at the entrance to the Stuslaw River, April 10 of last year.

Wallis Nash, one of the owners of the Anvil, said yesterday that in addition to cleaning and painting the vessel's engines are being overhauled and improvements made which will increase their efficiency. It is the intention to resume passenger service as well as cargo traffic, as some outside ports have guaranteed support inasmuch as regular coast steamers extend their schedules only to the larger cities.

After being floated the Anvil was brought to Portland and because of accrued claims she was sold at auction to Mr. Nash and associates. A new corporation has been formed and papers are to be filed in a few days, when negotiations will be closed for a dock here.

MYRTLE POINT ELECTION.

The city council held a special meeting last Monday night for the purpose of passing on the ordinance referring to the voters the question of issuing \$15,000 bonds to raise money for the construction of sewers in the city of Myrtle Point, and to get other matters lined up for the election, the date of which has been set for Tuesday, April 14.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.
