BANDON TO BUY VESSEL.

Direct Service with Portland Merchants in Prospect.

BANDON, Or., April 10.—W. E. Catterlin has been delegated by the business men of Bandon to go to Portland to complete arrangements for the purchase of a passenger and freight boat to be put on the run between Portland and Bandon.

The business men here have subscribed money for the purchase of a boat. The volume of freight is sufficient to make a boat between Portland and Bandon a paying investment, it is pointed out. Practically all of the shippers here have signed up, agreeing to route all their freight from the north via the direct boat.

Improved service from Portland to Bandon will mean a large amount of trade which now comes via San Francisco to Bandon. Those backing the venture contend that the freight business from Bandon to Portland will be doubled by the improved service which a boat making direct and regular runs will give.

DEATH OF REV. IRVINE

The following from the Champion, at Downey, Calif., tells additional particulars of the demise of the Rev. Thomas Irvine, formerly pastor of the Marsfield Baptist church:

Obituary

The Rev. Thomas Irvine, who died March 19, 1914, was born, educated, and grew up in the old city of Quebec, Canada. While still a young man he moved to upper Canada and engaged in a business career. Having from his earliest years been interested in religious questions, in the prime of life he became a Christian; retired from business, entered upon a course of study and took up the work of the ministry. His first pastorates were in Dakota. He later engaged in work in Washington, Oregon and finally California. For four and one-half years he was pastor of the Baptist church of Downey, since which time he has conducted a mission at his own home.

Until his recent illness, Pastor Irvine always enjoyed robust health. He had a sunny disposition and his life on the whole was a very busy and happy one.

For several days before his death he spent much of the time bidding a happy farewell to the many friends who called, leaving a message with each. He also sent messages to distant friends and relatives. As long as he could converse his mind remained unclouded. He spoke much of heaven and the wonders of what he saw and heard, but when asked to describe it would repeat "It is impossible. Eye hath not seen nor ear heard. Nor hath it entered in the heart of man what God hath prepared for those that love him." When reminded of the work he might still do, he plead with the friends not to hold him, to let him go, repeating "The attractions are so great I am just waiting for the passport."

The funeral services were conducted at the family residence by the Rev. A. M. Petty, secretary of the Baptist Home Mission Society, assisted by Rev. Fisher, of Los Angeles, and Rev. James Couth, of Eagle Rock. The music was rendered by Rev. and Mrs. Robinson of the Baptist church of Downey. The floral offerings were many and beautiful.

Friends from Los Angeles, Long Beach, Hollywood, Garden Grove, Norwalk and Clearwater mingled with the Downey friends at the service.

His wife and two daughters, Miss Constance of Downey, and Mrs. P. M. German of Garden Grove, remain.

Interment took place at the Downey cemetery.
