Will Leave—It is announced that Principal A. L. Barker of the Marshfield High School has decided not to remain here next year, but will accept a position in the east. His departure will be regretted.

Lincoln Anniversary—Capt. Dave Holden, of the Gasco, is the real observer of the anniversary of President Lincoln's death. Today he had the flag on the Gasco at half mast as he has had in previous years.

Coming Home—Miss Pearl Watkins, who has gained fame on the stage, will arrive here in May to spend a few weeks' vacation at the home of her parents, Judge and Mrs. George Watkins. She has been with the Lyceum Stock company in the east.

In Buenos Ayres—John Preuss, Jr., in a letter to Max Kruger, says he is now at Buenos Ayres, Brazil, and is disgusted with South America. He expects to return in a couple of months. He did not say whether Carl Johnson of Marshfield was still with him.

Want Slough Land—Some local parties are talking about trying to homestead the bed of Mill Slough, claiming that the title to it still remains with the government, even though it is now filled. Whether anything has been done, could not be learned today.

Sustains Will—Judge Hall has sent his decision to County Clerk Watson in the Kirkpatrick will case at Coquille. He sustains the will of Mrs. Kirkpatrick whereby the property is bequeathed to Mrs. B. F. Newman, the nurse who cared for her. The children were cut off. It was hotly contested.

Postpone Revivals—On account of the postponement of the Union Revival meetings till fall there will be no union prayer meeting this week, but each church will hold its own meeting in its respective place. On account of the Sock Social in the new hall of the M. E. Church the prayer meeting will close a little earlier than usual.

Open Market—A. H. Pense, of Isthmus Inlet, left today for Myrtle Point, where he will re-open a meat market there for Messrs. Jones and Gourley of the Palace Market in Marshfield. Mr. Pense formerly conducted the Bunker Hill market and has had twenty-two years experience in the butcher business. Since selling his Bunker Hill market, he has been residing on a ranch on Isthmus Inlet.

Kills Varmints—To Ben Munson, of Templeton, a brother of Captain Munson, of the Good ship Messenger, goes the distinction of a record for wildcats since March 1, having killed six wildcats since that time. He took the skins to Coquille on the afternoon train to collect the bounty. Mr. Munson says that the wild cats are very plentiful near Templeton, and it has been with very little effort that he has earned his \$30 as bounty.

Improve Inlet—The Port of Coos Bay has decided to grant the petition of A. G. Raab and others to expend \$1000 in improving the Kentuck Inlet channel from the coal bunkers to the Gamble ranch. The improved waterway will benefit many fine ranches. The ranchers and county court have already expended about \$7000 on the waterway while the Port has hitherto spent only \$1700.

J. P. Porter Here—J. P. Porter left at 4 o'clock this morning for Florence after spending a day looking after the work on this end of the line. He said that they had removed all of the machinery of the dredger except some steel rails before she was swept through the jetty and up on the North Spit night before last. He says that the railroad construction is being rushed as rapidly as the weather will permit.

Repair Dike—J. E. Fitzgerald last night won the contract for repairing the Coal Bank Inlet dike by the flip of a coin. F. P. Norton received three bids on the work, Johnson and Larson bidding \$77 and J. E. Fitzgerald and Hagquist & Larson bidding \$70, and so a coin was tossed up to decide the tie between the latter two. Mr. Fitzgerald will begin the work at once and do it under the supervision of Street Commissioner Lawhorne.

Destroy Hulk—Engineer Charlton of the Port of Coos Bay is figuring out a method of removing the hulk of the old Northwest, a sailing vessel which was left at Millington in Isthmus Slough and is now considered worthless. The Port Commission at its last meeting turned down an offer of the Chadwick heirs to give up their claim to land within the port lines on the east side of the Bay for \$2500.

Boy Dies—Louis Eglund, the seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Eglund, died last evening after a long illness of tuberculosis, but it was not known until a few weeks ago that consumption was his ailment. He was born at Eureka, and his parents formerly conducted the Arcade restaurant and the child was born in Eureka. The funeral will be held Friday afternoon at two o'clock from Dungan's Undertaking Parlor, the Rev. Joseph Knotts officiating.

Big Timbers—The C. A. Smith Company and the Simpson Lumber Company are to supply eight of the big timbers for the Oregon building at San Francisco. It was first thought to furnish Coos County's eight from the white cedar, but an investigation showed that there were very few of the white cedar trees that would measure up and consequently it has been decided to send four fir and four white cedar. Cornell Lagerstrom has been looking up the four for the C. A. Smith Company.

Made Good Time—V. C. Gorst started his Gardner-Coos Bay auto stage line yesterday. They made it in about an hour, the actual running time being twenty-five minutes. Ten Mile Creek was crossed easily by the three cars, which carried twelve passengers up and ten back. They will handle the Drain stage line business and Capt. Cornwall came down with them today. The Gardner-Florence auto line will start soon. A truck will be put on this end to carry baggage. A team will be kept at Ten Mile Creek for cases of emergency.
