**NEW FACTORIES, IMPROVEMENTS AND ENTERPRISES THAT  
 INCREASE THE PAYROLLS AND PROMOTE THE DEVELOP-  
 MENT OF OREGON**

Prepared by the State Bureau of  
 Industries and Statistics.  
 Voters at Eugene authorize a mu-  
 nicipal band, an armory, and the ac-  
 quiring of Skinner's Butte by the  
 city.  
 James J. Hill has given \$50,000 to  
 the Christ'an Church Bible School for  
 a new building at Eugene.  
 Officials of the Rogue River Pub-  
 lic Service corporation have been vis-  
 iting their plants at Grants Pass and  
 are looking for a 5000 horse power  
 site.  
 A \$10,000 Episcopal church is to  
 be erected at Oregon City.  
 Aurora is to have a \$60,000 four-  
 story Masonic Temple this year.  
 The Willamette Pacific Coos Bay  
 line is to have train service to the  
 end of the line in a week.  
 A life saving station is to be built  
 at Florence on the Sluslaw.  
 A beautiful high school building  
 has been erected at Stanfield of Baker  
 county stone.  
 The McVoy tub, pail and package  
 Company of Minneapolis are looking  
 for a site for a plant in Oregon.  
 Municipal securities are all that is  
 selling from Oregon in the east—  
 city, school, county and road bonds.  
 The \$5,000 has been raised for a  
 cannery at Cottage Grove.  
 A proposition to construct 100  
 miles of hard surface road at a cost  
 of \$750,000 in Linn county, will be  
 submitted to vote.  
 Corvallis will construct fifty blocks  
 of paving this year.  
 The first unit of the Beaver State  
 Motorcar factory at Gresham is com-  
 pleted and machinery being installed.  
 The Springfield Provision Co. will  
 establish a \$40,000 packing plant.  
 As a result of a made-in-Oregon  
 banquet at Albany, \$229.10 was raised  
 to beautify an old cemetery—  
 payrolls help even the dead.  
 The Danson basket factory at Bay  
 City has several large contracts from

florists.  
 A company is forming at The  
 Dalles to manufacture high class  
 sculptural and monumental work.  
 A Portland Hardware and Steel  
 firm is building large docks at As-  
 toria.  
 The Labor Commission of British  
 Columbia opposes the minimum wage  
 and says an eight hour law must be  
 a national affair for all Canada.  
 The Manufacturer's Association of  
 Portland is about equally divided on  
 the question of accepting insurance  
 under Compensation act of the last  
 legislature.  
 The Roseburg winter broccoli in-  
 dustry promises to be a success, as  
 good reports have been received of  
 Chicago shipments.  
 The red alder wood is interesting  
 manufacturers of clothespins and  
 that industry may be established in  
 Oregon.  
 Pendleton is erecting a beautiful  
 Catholic church of Baker stone.  
 A \$25,000 steel bridge is to be er-  
 ected at Kellogg, Douglas county.  
 An electric pump will drain 800  
 acres of Lake Wanato, Washington  
 county, for the onion industry.  
 A summer resort hotel is to go up  
 on Tsiltcoo lake, Lane county.  
 A new wooden ware factory is in  
 successful operation at Sellwood.  
 Lents will have a modern broom  
 factory.  
 Beaverton will have a brick yard.

**ARBOR DAY**

In most of the states of the Union  
 and in portions of Canada, Arbor  
 Day is a day on which the school  
 children and others plant trees and  
 shrubs along roadsides and in other  
 suitable places. It is a movable  
 festival, varying according to cli-  
 mate, though usually falling in  
 April or May, and in the United  
 States is appointed either by the  
 Legislature or the Governor, acting  
 under legislative authority. The  
 pioneer state in the movement was  
 Nebraska, Michigan and Minnesota  
 followed suit, then the Education  
 Department of Ontario ordered that  
 the first Friday in May should be  
 set apart for planting shade trees  
 and making flower beds in the  
 school grounds. New York did not  
 fall into line until 1888, when the  
 Governor proclaimed the Friday fol-  
 lowing the first day of May in each  
 year should be known as Arbor  
 Day. The day has been recognized  
 and imitated by Spain, where it is  
 known as the Fete of the Tree, and  
 each year the King and Queen plant  
 a tree or shrub a short distance  
 away from the palace, with appro-  
 priate ceremonies and celebrations  
 by the school children. The present  
 king inaugurated the custom.

**IN EARLIER  
 DAYS**

Chapter I  
**CAPTAIN WILLIAM TICHENOR,**  
 one of Portland's early marin-  
 ers, was in San Francisco in the  
 spring of 1851. He had just com-  
 pleted a voyage from Portland to San  
 Francisco on the Emily Farnham  
 when he was offered the command  
 of the steamer Sea Gull, a vessel of  
 over 400 tons.  
 Freight in those days was from  
 \$60 to \$80 per ton, and the cost  
 of a ticket to Portland was \$80.  
 Coal was from \$40 to \$60 per ton,  
 and the sailors received from \$60  
 to \$100 a month.  
 Captain Tichenor was appointed by  
 Governor Gaines, the territorial gov-  
 ernor of Oregon, as a pilot of the  
 Columbia river bar in April, 1851.  
 Captain White was the first man to  
 receive an appointment as pilot and  
 Captain Tichenor was the second.  
 Early in June Captain Tichenor  
 took nine men from Portland on  
 board the Sea Gull to make a set-  
 tlement at Port Orford. The men  
 were landed at Port Orford with the  
 understanding that upon the return  
 of the Sea Gull from San Francisco  
 additional recruits would be brought  
 for the settlement.  
 Upon arrival at San Francisco it  
 was found that it would be neces-  
 sary to make extensive repairs on  
 the Sea Gull, so Captain Knight of  
 the Pacific Mail company offered to  
 take up the recruits and supplies on  
 board the Columbia, under command  
 of Captain LeRoy. When the Colum-  
 bia steamed into Humboldt bay  
 and entered Port Orford there were  
 a number of Indian canoes paddling  
 southward. The ship fired her gun  
 to let the men left on the rock know  
 of her arrival. The moment her gun  
 was fired every Indian in the canoes  
 dived overboard. Coming to anchor  
 a boat was lowered and pulled ashore  
 at the base of the rock where the  
 nine men had been left lay a dead  
 Indian. Upon investigation, it was  
 found the camp had been broken up  
 and apparently the men had been  
 killed.  
 The Columbia proceeded on her  
 voyage and returned to San Francis-  
 co on July 1, 1851.  
 The Sea Gull was now ready for  
 sea. A large number of volunteers  
 were raised and free passage was  
 given them, and as San Francisco was  
 full of idle men, there was no diffi-  
 culty in getting as many men as were  
 wanted. The Sea Gull sailed on July  
 8, reached Port Orford on July 14  
 with 67 men, well armed and with  
 plenty of provisions. Two block  
 houses were erected and a perman-  
 ent settlement was started. The Sea  
 Gull proceeded to Portland, where  
 Captain Tichenor purchased six horse  
 some hogs, and where he also filed  
 his notification and settlers' oath  
 with Lieutenant Preston at the land  
 office in Oregon City. Lieutenant  
 Preston had recently been appoint-  
 ed surveyor general of Oregon. Cap-  
 tain Tichenor employed W. G. T.  
 Vault who had been recommended to  
 him by Lieutenant Phil Kearney, a  
 schoolmate of Captain Tichenor's in  
 Newark, N. J.  
 On July 21, the Sea Gull sailed  
 from Portland for Port Orford. It  
 was found that some of the men ta-  
 ken from San Francisco to Port Or-  
 ford were men of desperate char-  
 acter, so 14 of them were taken aboard  
 the ship to be returned to San Fran-  
 cisco. Captain Tichenor learned that  
 the men who had been left on Bat-  
 tle Rock had escaped and that three  
 of them were in Portland.—Port-  
 land Journal.
