NORTH BEND LIBRARY

The North Bend Library Association met at the library Thursday afternoon and enjoyed one of the most interesting and encouraging sessions held since its reorganization two months ago. Mrs. Sengstacken, of Marshfield, the foremost of Coos County library workers, was present and read a paper she had prepared on the library movement in Marshfield from its beginning eight years ago. The paper is valuable as a contribution to Coos County educational history and the ladies hearing it read were inspired and enlightened for the great work they have before them in North Bend. Mrs. Sengstacken dwelt especially upon the hearty cooperation the Marshfield library efforts had always had on the part of the city schools; the board, teachers and pupils having from the beginning realized the value of a public library to school work. She also told in terms now encouraging and now discouraging of the attitude of the Marshfield City Council toward the library during all these eight years. Mrs. L. J. Simpson having just come home, was present for the first time since the association was organized and spoke in hopeful terms of the encouragement she thought the North Bend association might expect from its own Council and the Mayor once the matter was brought to their attention.
