

REV. HALL ON SHANNON TYPE

Editor Times:

With reference to an article signed "A Churchgoer" appearing recently in your valuable paper, in which the Shannon type of evangelism was deplored, would like to say that the writer gives himself or herself completely away in passing judgment upon that revival for it says "the writer was not present when Shannon was here." Where then, did he or she get such valuable information?

While I do not want to offend any "mother" or "grandmother" in Israel, I would like to emphasize the fact that Shannon's revival was a blessing to Marshfield. We have had a great many events in our city which have taken far more money out of the city, but no complaints have been recorded even though the results for good were to say the least questionable.

"Churchgoer" says "the notoriety of Shannon was far-reaching." This is very evident, for it certainly reached "Churchgoer," who claims to have been outside of Marshfield, and itself speaks well for the effort. Yes, the effect of Shannon's work reached to Hell itself on one side, and even as far as Alaska on the other side, a truth attested to by a great many people.

Shannon certainly did use abusive methods" as "Churchgoer" would have it. He abused sin unmercifully. The sin of the slums of New York or Chicago is no worse than the sin of Marshfield. Sin is the same everywhere and requires about the same methods in dealing with it. None but the wicked man and the sinner ever had anything abusive to say of Shannon and his methods. He whose toes are trodden on is the one who kicks the hardest.

So far as "sensational methods" are concerned, I would say that every worker except the religious worker conceded the right to use sensational methods. If he does, even once or twice, the most terrible things are spoken of him.

I have seen people lose control of themselves over an election, shout themselves hoarse and act crazy at a Fourth of July celebration, throw up their hats and forget to get them again, at a football game, but that was all right. At the Myrtle Point fair I saw a woman start from away in the rear of the grand stand and come down the passageway several steps at a time until she was down in front of the whole crowd, where she stopped and danced up and down and then squealed like a young hyena. And all over a race that was then taking place. Nobody was "shocked," nobody was "humiliated." But if this or anything half as bad, had been done at a revival meeting, the world would have known of it.

John the Baptist was a very sensational preacher of his own time. He couldn't "roll up his sleeves," it is true, neither could he "take off his coat," but he used strong language and called the people hard names, and they fitted. The people of Marshfield will never forget Shannon for his work and influence are still here. There are business men in Marshfield who would give Shannon \$100 each to come back.

The Ministerial Association has had the consideration of an evangelist under advisement for a long time. Many have been considered. Dr. Bulgin is the man they have selected as best fitted for the Marshfield work. We have no reason to doubt their action in the matter. His work is attested to by men who know him as being one of the best evangelists of the present time and some place him as the peer of all others.

It is sincerely hoped that he will come to our city later. At present the proposed campaign is postponed because thirty-five churches of Los Angeles, California, requested that he come there in May. The Marshfield ministers, therefore, gave way to this request.
