Bernitt and Wittig Allowed \$3600 But Ownership Is Still in Doubt.

A message received from Portland announces that Judge Wolverton in the United States District court altig \$3,600 damages in their case against the Smith-Powers Company in volving the ownership of the Coos River boom. The message is indef-inite as to whether the court allows them to retain a half interest in the booms or whether the payment of the \$3,600 by the Smith-Powers Com-pany will give the latter undisputed posession of the ownership of the

In the message it is stated that Bernitt and Wittig are allowed \$1. 000 for half interest in boom, \$1200 for handling Simpson Lumber com-pany logs, \$900 for handling Gould logs and over \$400 for other booming

The suit of Bernitt and Wittig was for a half interest in the booms which it is claimed cost over \$54,000. Smith Powers company contented that Ber-nitt and Wittig did not have a half interest in the boom but merely were employed on it by the Dean Company. Smith-Powers Company Will Establish Base of Operations on New Line There.
