

LUMBERMEN TO INSPECT MILL

Florida Delegation Visits the Smith Mill—An Eastern Dealer Also Here.

Coos Bay this week has been the mecca of a number of prominent lumbermen who came here to inspect the C. A. Smith mill and get ideas for new mills in Florida. In the party was Sam Carpenter and M. Paul of the Carpenter & O'Brien Lumber Company of Florida. With them were Mr. Monahan of the Monorall company and also Designer Hough who designed the C. A. Smith company's boats. The Carpenter & O'Brien Company are building a big steel and concrete electrically equipped mill at Jacksonville, Fla. The party was especially interested in the package system of handling lumber as they are planning to utilize it in shipping lumber from the new mill to Philadelphia, a distance of about 800 miles. They are also planning to have Mr. Hough design them a vessel similar to the Adeline Smith and to carry about \$3,000,000 feet. The party left on the Adeline yesterday.

New York Lumberman.

Sloman & Company, hardwood lumber dealers of Buffalo, is here from New York City looking over the Port Orford White Cedar, Myrtlewood and Spruce with a view of getting their future supply from here. He is conferring with the Smith Company and Simpson Company.

C. A. Smith and F. A. Warner are still in the east and no word has been received from relative to the big timber deal that they are reported to be negotiating.

MANY RUMORS ARE AFLOAT

Report That Southern Pacific Wants Kinney Property—Northwestern Rumor.

Even the Mexican war has not put an end to the rumors about big doings on Coos Bay. One report circulated at North Bend is to the effect that the Southern Pacific is planning to take over the Kinney holdings as soon as the receivership proceedings get to a point where a sale can be made. It is further claimed that the object is to get the waterfrontage of the Kinney property and also the Pony Inlet flat yards, machine shops, round house, etc.

The appraisers will probably finish their appraisal in ten days. **Northwestern Rumor.** The Northwestern Railway extension to Coos Bay is another rumor that is persistently circulated. The rumor is coupled with the claim that a prominent Coos Bay man had recently received a letter from a prominent eastern Railway official substantiating the Northwestern report and that something definite will be announced soon.

CONTEMPT CASE IS DISMISSED

Mayor Allen, John D. Goss and Constable Cox Freed by Judge Coke Today.

Judge J. S. Coke today handed down a decision freeing John D. Goss, Mayor F. E. Allen, Constable Cox and V. C. Gorst on the charges of contempt of court in connection with the sale of the Robert Fox automobile at North Bend. Judge Coke sustained a motion of John D. Goss to dismiss the contempt proceedings on the grounds of errors in the original proceedings of H. G. Hoy who claimed to have bought the car from Fox or Mrs. Ogren, Fox's sister whom Fox had given a bill of sale.

Mayor Allen attached the car to secure a house rent bill and Harry G. Hoy sought to enjoin the sale of the auto. The notice of the injunction was not served except a phone message about it being sent to North Bend.

COLORADO HAS REAL WAR ON

Eleven Killed, Score Missing and Three Big Mines Burned in Coal Strike Here.

TRINIDAD, Colo., April 24.—A skirmish between the militia and strikers near Bunker Hill resulted in a victory for the guardsmen, according to a report this afternoon. The strikers were reported split in two. The fighting between the militia and strikers began at 11 o'clock at Bunker Hill, south of Monson. The strikers captured two trains. It is reported. Cavalrymen turned their horses loose and entrenched. A message reported that cavalrymen at full gallop passed through Rouse with the artillery.

TRINIDAD, Colo., April 24.—With the toll of yesterday's fighting unknown, three mining properties burned to the ground and others reported destroyed and the fate of twenty-five refugees of the Empire mine, who took refuge in the mine, still in doubt and the rapidly increasing army of strikers still active, the situation in Southern Colorado is more critical than at any time since the strike. Eleven were reported killed yesterday and a score missing.

It is reported that the strikers approached those imprisoned in the Empire mine and offered to conduct them safely out of the strike district.

Agular, normally a thriving city of 2000, is depopulated today. Terrorized by the events of the last few days, the citizens have fled in all directions.

SCOUT CRUISER PASSES HERE

U. S. S. Albany En Route to South from Puget Sound—Makes 22 Knots.

The U. S. Scout Cruiser, Albany, passed Coos Bay at 4:30 yesterday afternoon, bound for San Francisco, where she will await orders, to-day and leave for the scene of hostilities at Vera Cruz. The wireless operator of the Albany reported to Operator Williamson, of the Coos Bay Wireless station that the Albany would be in San Francisco early today. He reported a heavy sea outside.

People residing in the vicinity of South Inlet were able to see the vessel, when she steamed majestically through the waters of the Pacific, toward the firing line. The Albany has a displacement of 3420 tons, was built in the year 1899, at Newcastle England and was formerly the Brazilian Steamship, Nitheroy. Her speed in rough seas is 22 knots, and she carries 18 officers and 327 men. Uncle Sam maintains 22 Scout Cruisers of the type of the Albany and in all probability half of this fleet will be dispatched to the scene of hostilities.
