AERIAL FERRY FOR OAKLAND

First Regular Air Transporta-tion Line to Be Established in California City.

(Special to The Times.)
OAKLAND, Cal., April 29.—The
first aerial ferry building in the
world is being constructed in Oakland. It will be completed shortly
and the ferry itself will be in operation within two months.

The "ferry" building, or hangar,
is going up at the foot of Washington street, and will be the headquarters of the new aerial line from
Oakland to San Frâncisco. One of
the "boats" is already here and
three more are on the way.

Each hydroplane is capable of carrying 1000 pounds, which means at least three passengers and the aviator, or more passengers if they are light ones. As fare is to be charged on a basis of weight—four cents a pound-fat men will be more welcome than lean ones as

The hydroplanes that will be used in the ferry service will make Oak-land their headquarters. A land-ing place has been secured at the foot of Washington street, and landings will be made on a huge floating pontoon.
The 'planes are not high flyers,

the promoters of the plan saying they will not rise more than thirty feet in the air during the trip across the bay.

SPUDS AND HOW

Government Issues a Bulletin of Interest to Potato Growers Everywhere.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 29. Irish potatoes are one of the easiest and most profitable suburban crops, They may be grown on almost any type of soil which posesses sufficient moisture and plant food, though they thrive best on sandy loam or gravel loam soils, and it is on these types that maximum crops of high quality potatoes can be produced.

If the land which is to be planted to potatoes is not likely to wash in the winter, plow in the fall to a depth from 9 to 10 inches if the character of the land will permit. Deep plow-ing insures a greater waterholding enpacity. Spare no pains in fitting the land for planting. Thorough preparation is essential to large yields, advises the Department of Agriculture.

Should a poor sod land be selected for a potato bed, apply from 1,000 to 1,500 pounds of a fertilizer analyzing from 2 to 3 per cent of ammonin, 6 to 7 per cen cent of phosphoric acid and 7 to 8 per cent of potash. If a stubble or corn land is used increase the ammonia to 3 1-2 or 4 per cent. Half the ammonia should be derived from dried blood, tankage, or other organic forms and the other half nitrate of soda or ammonium sulphate.

Select a variety of seed potatoes which is known to do well in the locality. Some good varieties of the potatoes are Irish Cobbler, Early Ohlo, Rose Four, for early potatoes, and Green Mountain and Peerless for late growth. The importance of good seed can not be too strongly emphasized. In the first place, the seed should be free from varietal mixture and discease, and true to name and type. The tubers should be reasonable smooth and firm, with the first sprouts j usarttstaoln with the first sprouts just starting into growth.

Plant these potatoes from 3 to 6 inches in depth depending on the nature of the soil. Plant shallow on heavy clay soils and deep on light sandy or muck soils. Plant in rows from 30 to 36 inches and from 10 to 14 inches apart depending on variety grown and the fertility of the Early varieties can be planted closer than late ones. Cover seed with at least 3 inches of soil. If planted as outlined 15 to 20 bushels of seed potatoes per acre will be re

Give first tiliage before plants push through the ground. The aim should be to keet the surface of the soil loose and free from weeds. Continue cultivations at frequent intervala remembering to go shallower each time, and gradually narrowing the space tilled. Potato plants are usually sprayed to protect them against leaf-cating insect pests or fungus pests. Protection against these insects is usually secured by some form of arsenical poison such as arsenute of lead, or paris green. potato plant may be protected against fungus diseases by keeping its foliage covered with Bordeaux
