## HIGH SCHOOL FIELD RECORD

### Interesting Facts Concerning Coos County Athletics—Summary of Winners During Last Four Years.

Chauncey Clarke, a graduate of the Marshfield high school, has kept a list of the best records made in the Coos county high school field meets for the past four years and it will be of much interest now owing to the 1914 meet being scheduled to be held at Myrtle Point soon. A summary of it follows:

High jump, 5 feet 9 inches, Clarke, Marshfield.  
Running broad jump, 20 feet 6 inches, Hodson, North Bend.  
Standing broad jump, 9 feet 6 1/2 inches, Laird, Bandon.  
Shot put, 41 feet 6 1/2 inches, Brackley, North Bend.  
Hammer throw, 108 feet 6 inches, Strang, Bandon.  
Mile relay 4-man team, 4:01, Bandon.  
Five years ago the first interscholastic track meet ever held in Coos county was won by Marshfield on the local track. Since then this event has become a fixed feature on the high school calendar and it is doubtful if any other athletic contest equals it in popularity or size. During this period Marsh-

field has carried off first honors on three occasions, Bandon on two. For the year 1914 the question might be asked, "Who are the champions?"  
It is a little early in the season to make any predictions as to what will be the ultimate outcome of this year's competition. The above records, however, will prove interesting to the devotees of the cinder path who have watched the development of athletics in our own little corner of the globe. It is true that these records are far from being world beaters in the line of athletic accomplishment. But to "Coosites" they mean more than the mere figures would indicate. They are a beginning and a fairly good one at that. Many of the marks which stand as Coos county's best were made under unfavorable conditions, such as heavy head winds and cold weather. Lack of coaching has also been one of the disadvantages which some of the schools have had to contend with at different times.  
With the growth of county, city and schools, training facilities are rapidly improving so that the Coos athletes of today are a better trained lot than those who represented us five years ago.  
Naturally with the bettering of conditions and the added experience of high school competitors, new marks are being set every year and 1914 will probably see many old records very badly shattered.  
It is not probable, however, that Clarke's mark in the high jump, which by the way, stood as a state record for a short time, will be beaten unless he himself undertakes the task.  
Hodson's broad jump and century records are good enough to win points in almost any meet, and it is doubtful if they can be bettered this year.  
Gardiner's time in the 220, Bowman's 440 record and Larson's time in the half mile run will also prove hard to lower, while the shot put record is another mark which may still stand as high. In the other events new records will probably be set this year.  
The discus and the javelin will appear for the first time on the athletic program while the standing broad jump, which was cut out of last spring's competition, will also be included. These three events will probably prove important factors in winning the meet as in them will rest much of the unknown strength of the different teams.
