Illinois Coming to the Front.
Excerpts from report of Mrs. Helen L. Hood, president of the Illinois W. C. T. U., to the Union Signal:

"Incomplete returns show that our state has cause to rejoice over many victories gained at the polls on April 7. Out of 235 townships voting, 162 voted dry and 73 for the saloon. Twenty-three dry counties are added, making the entire number in the state fifty-three. Illinois is now more than one-half dry. Some of the richest counties voted dry. Eleven large cities voted against the licensing of saloons, which have a large foreign population voted dry. Over 100,000 women voted and the returns indicate that seventy per cent cast their ballots against the saloon."

Deputy, Elgin, Rockford, Galesburg, Clinton, Monmouth, Pontiac, Freeport (which town has had saloons for over forty years) are some of the places in the dry columns and returns are adding to the number each day. Thirty-six women were elected officials in as many counties.

According to reports up to date, as a result of the April 7th elections, over 1000 saloons have gone out of business. Leaders of every party are convinced that women are a good factor. Over 1600 women in Chicago voted for Prohibition at the democratic candidates. Women of the clubs, suffrage, missionary and other associations with the W. C. T. U. women joined in the common fight against the saloon."

The following states have statewide prohibition:
Maine, Kansas, North Dakota, Georgia, Mississippi, Oklahoma, Tennessee, North Carolina and West Virginia.

The following are woman suffrage states:
Colorado, Wyoming, Washington, Idaho, Oregon, California, Illinois, Kansas and Alaska Territory.

Pioneer Gold Beach Woman Succumbs There.

GOLD BEACH, Ore. May 1.—Mrs. Nathaniel Huntley, who died in Gold Beach on April 25, was one of the oldest pioneers of Curry county, coming to Oregon when a young woman, and she brought up a large family under the trying conditions incident to life in the isolated and unsettled area of Southwestern Oregon in the early days. Mrs. Huntley was 83 years old when she died and was one of the very few remaining who crossed her plains in the 50's.
