Oregon Railroad Commission Fixes Them-No Action on Coos Bay Rates.

The Oregon Railroad Commission has not yet fixed the rates for Marshfield and North Bend although it has in the St. John's water case which submitted later than the Coos, Bay case. The order is expected almost any time. A recent dispatch from Salem says: Pronouncing the water rates charged by the St. Johns | • Water Works & Lighting Company unreasonable and discriminatory to ally reducing the rates. The order have was the result of a complaint made agrinst the company by the city of

To determine the rates to be charg-ed in the future the Commission found it necessary to fix the physical valuation for the plant. The Com mission found the original cost of the properties of the company to be \$122-000 and found the present physical valuation of the plant to be \$89,-500. Further thee Commission found that from August, 1903, to June 30, 1913, the revenue of the company wa \$174.615.57, and that in addition bonuses for pipes and mains laid am-

ed. During the same period its general expenses aggregated \$77,224.89. To equalize the rates in the future the Commission in its order has divided the customers into two classes. A and B, and has fixed both a flat and meter rate. Under the order no customer can be placed on a meter rate if his flat rate does not exceed \$1.25 a month, unless he so elects. In class A the order fixes the fiat rate for the first faucet at 90 cents and for class B at \$1.40. rates for both classes are fixed at \$1, if paid four months in advance. A graduated rate is fixed for additional faucets.

The meter rate fixes the first rate for the first 100 cubic feet at 30 cents 400 cubic feet at 20 cents, 1500 cubic feet at 12 cents and all over 20,eoo cubic feet at six cents. That is for meters of any size in one month.
