

# FORTY FEET OF WATER ON BAR

### Peter Loggie Predicts it Will Be Realized Soon After Inner Channel is Done

North Bend last evening held one of the most enthusiastic booster meetings that has been held there in many a day. The hall was crowded and the speakers were warmly applauded as they paid tribute to the opportunities here and the certainty of marked development in the near future. N. C. McLeod presided and in introducing the various speakers complimented them and waxed enthusiastic over the Bay, which he has boosted at every opportunity in his long residence here.

Peter Loggie spoke particularly on the harbor, its development and what should be done. He urged the people of the district to sign the harbor bond petition. He said that with the inner channel project completed, Coos Bay would be in a position to insist on the government improving the bar to the same standard and he declared it would not be long until there is forty feet of water on the bar.

A. H. Derbyshire spoke briefly on the future of Coos Bay and especially of the progress of North Bend. He said that North Bend has been waiting now for several years expecting that the next season would bring the promised era of development but now he felt that the coming year would bring to a realization the long cherished hopes.

Dr. Withycombe spoke of Oregon possibilities and especially of southwestern Oregon, predicting great development in this section.

Tom Richardson spoke along practically the same lines that he addressed the boosters in Marshfield Tuesday night. The North Bend band was out and rendered a number of pleasing selections.

## WITHYCOMBE ON CITIES GROWTH

### Says He is Pleased to Note Splendid Progress of Coos Bay Since His Last Visit

James Withycombe, of Corvallis, who is in Marshfield today, says that he notes a wonderful change in this city since he visited here six years ago.

"I have always been optimistic as to the development of Coos Bay and am pleased to note the splendid progress that has been made here," said Withycombe, this morning. "To my mind Coos Bay is one of the favored sections of the United States and destined to be one of the important ports of the world."

"With the opening of the Panama Canal, the Pacific Ocean will become greater in the annals of maritime activity of the world, and Coos Bay, with its immense timber, mineral and agricultural resources, should make every possible preparation for its expansion."

Mr. Withycombe was director of the experiment station at the Oregon Agricultural college for sixteen years. He resigned last March to take up his campaign for governor. He says that the Oregon Agricultural college is one of the three largest agricultural colleges in the United States and one of the best equipped.

Withycombe spoke at North Bend last night and will leave tomorrow for other points in this section, including Coquille, Myrtle Point and Bandon. He will speak before the Farmers Union at their picnic at Coquille Saturday on the agricultural possibilities of Coos county.
