Parish Meeting.—At 8 o'clock this evening in Guild Hall there will be the annual parish meeting, called to elect a Vestry Board for the ensuing year and to hear reports from various parish organizations. The members and friends of the church are invited to attend.

To Spend Summer Here.—Dr. J. T. McCormac has rented the Carl Evertsen residence at 10th and Commercial avenue and will remain on Coos Bay for the months of June, July and August. Mrs. McCormac and Fred will arrive next week.

Install Tennis Court.—R. F. Williams has had a cement tennis court built in the grounds of his residence at Ninth street and Central avenue. This is the first cement court in Marshfield and will undoubtedly

WHI Sell Stock.—J. C. Kendall, assignee of E. W. Kammerer, has decided to sell the Toggery stock at retail and will start the sale Saturday evening or Monday morning. There is about \$5000 worth of fine clothing and merchandise and he plans to sell it at wholesale cost price. The fixtures will also be sold and the two-year lease at \$72 per month will be sold. Mr. Kammerer's debts amount to only about \$3000.

Pay Larson.—The county commissioners yesterday finally ordered Julius Larson paid the \$600 balance due him on his contract for improving Kentuck Inlet. This has been hanging fire for three or four years and many of the records of the matter were lost.

Injured Today.—Carson Garrett was brought here today to be treated at Mercy Hospital for injuries he sustained today by a fall off the scaffolding of the bridge on the North Fork of the Coquille. He fractured his arm near the wrist. He is about 21 years of age and his parents live at Gold Hill. He was a member of the local railroad bridge crew.

New Truck Arrives.—A new truck for the gasoline car which is operated over the Willamette Pacific Railroad between Marshfield and North Bend, arrived this morning on the Nann Smith, and several skilled mechanics have been busy all day attaching it to the car. The work is in charge of Ed Bunnell, mechanical engineer. The new truck weighs 3300 pounds and cost the company about \$1700. It was shipped from Omaha by rail to San Francisco, thence to Marshfield by the water route. The car has been out of commission for over a month but will be on the run again in a few days.
