San Francisco Chamber of Commerce Appeals to F. D. Fletcher for Statement

F. D. Fletcher, representative of the Sperry Flour company, this morning received a letter from the Nation-al and Foreign Affairs committee of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce which is to ascertain the mer-its of the contention of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce in moving the Life Saving Station from its present location across the Bay near Charleston.

It is held that the present location is about two miles from the scene of most of the trouble when an accident occurs and that under such conditions the service is inadequate. Senato Chamberlain has introduced a bill in Congress asking for an appropriation of \$47,000 for moving the station.

Mr. Fletcher said that he would take the matter up with Captain Ol-son of the Adeline Smith, Captain Magee of the Nann Smith and Captain Erickson of the Redondo and get from them an expression of their opinions as to the advisability of moving the station. There seems to no opposition to the contention that the station should be moved. The text of the letter from Sec. C. P. Connors of the committee of the San Francisco Chamber follows:

The San Francisco Chamber of Commerce has been requested by the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce ro support a bill in Congress providing appropriation for the moving of the Life Saving Station at Coos Bay from its present location to a point nearer the entrance of the harbor. Before Before taking action the National and Foreign Affairs Committee of this Cham ber would like to have your opinion as to the desirability of this clange. Any information you can give will be appreciated."

"P. S.-Mr. S. B. McNear suggest. ed we write to you as you could probably inform the committee if the suggested move had the approval of Life Saving Station people in Marshfield.

To Point Out Needs.

Mr. Fletcher took the matter up with the local Chamber of Commerce. In addition to the letters which he will have the captains send, he will write a letter pointing out the reas-ons for the change. He will also call attention to the fact that at present the small crafts plying to and from South Inlet are utterly unprotected by the life savers, whereas in the new location the live savers would be near enough to prevent accidents.



TEN ACRE HOMESTEAD

Bill Introduced Cpens Way For Per-

sons to Get Summer Outing. WASHINGTON, May 8.—A bill providing to allow all heads of famlies to acquire title to a 10-acrhomestead has been introduced by Re presentative Baker. Should the meas ure pass, the head of a family would have the right to enter 10 acres of unoccupied public lands within or outside of forest reserves as a sum-mer homestead". Proof may be offered after three years, and must show that the entryman has made permanent improvements to the value of not less than \$300, and has resided the land not less than two upon months of each summer. The outry-man must also pay \$5 per acre if the area is timbered and \$1.25 if non-timbered, before patent will be issued.


The patent gives a surface right only. The object of the bill is 13 provide permanent summer homes in the mountains, to which title can be secured.

IOWA HENS RECORD.

Iowa hens lay more than a billion eggs a year, worth \$21,000,000, ac-cording to figures made public by the state department of agriculture. The reports received from township assessors show that there are 36,092,-390 fowls on Iowa farms and that the egg production for twelve months amounts to 97,549,731 dozen. The department estimates the value of poultry and eggs for a year is \$38. 000,000. This is more than the an-nual output of all the gold mines in Alaska, or California, or Colorado, or any state in the Union. Iowa's poultry and egg crop for a year would buy 64,000 automobiles at \$600 This would allow one car to each. every 35 persons in the state. The percapita production of eggs in Iowa is 44.2 dozen or one and a half eggs for every person in the state every day in the year.
