

Carnegie Peace Commission **Report Says Horrors Were** Worse Than Portrayed.

clated Press to Coos Bay Times.] NEW YORK, May 7.—Results of an exhaustive investigation into the conditions in the Balkans during and following the wars of 1912 and 1913 with a view to clarifying public opin-ion which has been baffled by conflicting reports and befogged by un-authentic detail were made public by the Balkan Commission of Inquiry of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace

Pessimism based on the terrible moral consequences of a war which was a series of unutterable atrocities, characterizes the conclusions of the commission as to the possibilities of immediate peace or stability among the Balkan nations. The situation at present, in the final judgment of the commission, is hardly suscept-ible of a peaceful solution. "Under present conditions," reads the report, "the case seems well nigh hopeless." The report contains seven chapters and a preface by Nicholas Murray Burler

Stabbing through the glamor of warfare which attended the trium-phant demobilization of the Servian phant demobilization of the Servian troops and all the customary glorifi-cations of the victors, the commission found conditions of desolation, utter wretchedness and social and immoral disintegration which defied full por-trayal even in its comprehensive re-port. This moral and social chaos is the direct result, according to the commission, of the unspeakable prac-tices of the contending forces. The recital of these barbarities which forms the principal part of the report is the first detailed and collective presentation of facts which have so far been offered to the world princtfar been offered to the world principally in the form of newspaper re-ports, and charge and counter charge. The list of horrors compiled from the statements of eye-witnesses for whose reliability the commission vouches, is at times more startling than the unsupported rumors which were former-





DENVER, Colo., May 7.---Major Hamrock, Lleutenant Linderfelt and the militia detachment under them are charged with the respon-sibility of the Ludlow battle and fire which cost 21 lives, in the report of the Women's Peace League committee to Governor Ammons. The reports recommends an inves-tigation of all happenings to the end that a distinction may be estab-lished between "rightful exercise of military power and crimes of individuals, turning the latter over to civil authorities for prosecution."
