

COOS COUNTY LANDS OPENED FOR ENTRY LAST OF JUNE

About 32,000 Acres in Southern Coos and Northern Curry Excluded from Timber Reserve

It is presumed that the coal area south of Myrtle Point, which has been the bone of contention for several years, is embraced in the tract of 32,000 acres in southern Coos and northern Curry which has been ordered excluded from the government timber reserve and will be open to entry after June 27. Most of the coal area has been entered by Grants Pass men. Concerning it a Portland dispatch says:

"A tract of approximately 32,800 acres of land in southern Coos and northern Curry counties has been excluded from the Siskiyou National Forest, according to an executive order issued by President Wilson, telegraphic notice of which was received at the Portland office of the Forestry Department yesterday.

"This step is in keeping with the policy of the present administration in withdrawing from forest reserves all lands that are suitable for farms and what may be utilized for agricultural purposes. Chief Forester Graves personally inspected the Oregon reserves recently in order to determine how that policy might be furthered in this territory.

"40-Acre Units Segregated. Of the area eliminated, about 15,000 acres are vacant public lands, segregated into units of from 40 acres up. The balance of the land has already been entered under the general public land laws or the forest homestead law and the occupants of claims thus established will not be disturbed. It is understood that the public lands involved will all be subject to settlement under the homestead law on and after June 29, but entries at the local land office will not be permitted until July 27. No information has yet been received, however, as to whether any of the public land has

been specially withdrawn, or classified, so as to prevent or restrict the right of settlement and entry.

Grants Pass Men Recommend.
"The lands were eliminated from the National Forest on the recommendation of the supervisor, N. F. MacDuff, of Grants Pass, Or. It is understood that a large portion of the land is suited by climate, topography and soil to the form of agricultural use common to the coast country, but the principal reason for the elimination is the fact that only a very small percentage of the area is permanently suited to the establishment and maintenance of a forest, and the cost of administration, protection and management of this small percentage of the land is too great to warrant the retention of the land under withdrawal.

"The lands in question are all situated in the Roseburg Land District. The Roseburg office will doubtless soon be informed of the manner in which settlement and entry may be made and the restrictions upon the right of settlement and entry."

WATER SYSTEM ON COOS BAY

State Engineer Lewis Receives Filings for Coos Bay Cities—Seydel's Project

SALEM, Or., May 8.—Construction work on the municipal water supply for Marshfield and North Bend will commence before June 1, according to an application filed with State Engineer John H. Lewis. The pipeline will be 18 miles long, and will divert the water from the Millcoma River. The present population to be served is 6000 and the cost of the work will be \$150,000.

MAY BE SEYDEL PLAN Thought That Portland Man is Behind North Coos River Project

The above is believed to be the plan of Mr. Seydel, of Portland, who was here a few months ago figuring on buying the Coos Bay Water Company's system or installing an independent system for North Bend. After getting figures and measurements on the flow of North Coos River and South Coos River, he left and did not give out his plans. It is believed, however, that he has filed on the water rights of North Coos (known as Millcoma River.) However, he has not done anything towards getting franchises here, although he was assured that he would be granted one at North Bend.

Seydel has been at Coquille the last few weeks adding in installing the new pipeline being put in there to increase the city's supply. He sold them the material for the extension.

The C. A. Smith Company and others have been figuring on the Coos River supply also.

The Marshfield City Council was considering it as the source for the future municipal system.
