FISH PUMPED IN BY DREDGE

Dal Cathcart Has Several Hundred Trout in His Lot —Try to Save Them

This morning S. B. Cathcart noticed a disturbance on the water pumped into his garden recently by the dredge, and upon investigation discovered that the miniature lake was filled with fresh-water trout, the number of which he estimated at 500. At present there is about seven feet of water in the enclosure. The fish stay on top of the water, evidently not satisfied with the salt water, as they are of the mountain or brook variety of trout, which is a fresh water fish. Some account for their appearance by the fact that the dredge has been pumping in fresh water from the mouth of Coos River and has deposited the fish in the West Marshfield fill and they have gone as far up stream as possible searching for fresh water. Frank Smith, of the Coos River Hatchery, has been notified and had telegraphed the fish commissioner asking what should be done. It may become necessary to arrange for an outlet in order that the fish may return to the fresh-water tributaries of the bay. A number of people have witnessed the strange appearance of the fish today.

BANDON, Or. May 9.—The Circuit Court has appointed T. P. Hanly of Lampa to handle the logs that are in litigation between the Coach Timber company and the Cody Lumber company on the Lampa Creek tract. The receiver was appointed in the suit of St. Clair County Savings Bank vs. Coach Timber company and Cody Lumber company. It is believed that this procedure will offer temporary solution of the difficulty, in that the logs will be marketed and the parties will litigate over the funds instead of stopping work through litigation over the timber.

Equipment Changes Hands.
The Cody Lumber company's logging railroad plant and equipment were bid in at sheriff's sale on a mortgage foreclosure by the George W. Moore Lumber company for the sum of \$50,000. It is the intention of the Moore Lumber company to put the outfit into the Boutan tract of timber on the other side of the river and it is believed that their mill will be able to run on logs from that tract within a short time.—Bandon World.
