**Three Arrests.**—Frank Heckman, Swan Oleson and Al Hendrickson were the three offenders in police court today for drunkenness.

**School Board Meet.**—The Marshfield School Board held a meeting last night for the payment of monthly bills and the transaction of other financial business.

**Aid for Miners.**—A. Rudeberg has been circulating a subscription list for the aid of the destitute miners' families. Whether it was for some of the miners at Libby or the Colorado miners could not be learned today.

**Fire at Ranch.**—Fire, supposed to have started from a spark, destroyed a two-story dairy building at the ranch of Mrs. Alice Kruse on Isthmus Inlet this week. For a time, the blaze threatened the big barn and other buildings.

**Large Egg.**—Mrs. P. D. Blake brought to the Times office today an egg of unusual size, measuring 6 1/2 by 7 and a fraction inches. The egg was laid by a Black Minorca pullet raised from an egg from C. E. Nicholson's blooded flock.

**Very Ill.**—Wm. Thom, father of Chas. Thom of the North Bend Brewery, is reported critically ill today. He is suffering from a fourth stroke of paralysis. He is about eighty-six years old and has resided in North Bend six years.

**Name Committee.**—The Spanish-American War Veterans have appointed D. A. Jones, F. K. Gettins and E. H. Joehnk a committee to arrange for Memorial Day services. They hope to get Prof. Resler of O. A. C., who will deliver the high school commencement addresses on the Bay, to deliver the principal address.

**Wed Last Night.**—Elmer Viers and Miss Mabel Brunner were married last evening at the Marshfield Baptist church, the Rev. A. F. Bassford officiating. Only immediate relatives were present. They are well known and a host of friends will unite in extending their best wishes. Mr. Viers is a decorator and a brother of C. W. Viers.

**Adjust Assessments.**—A. B. Collier, deputy county assessor, was at North Bend yesterday and today trying to readjust the assessments on property affected by cuts and fills there. He says it is a difficult job as the cost of the street work will in some instances more than \$150 greater than the assessed valuation of the lot. Mr. Collier is the candidate for the Democratic nomination and has no opposition in the primaries.

**Marshfield Teacher.**—The Coquille Sentinel says: "A. J. M. Robertson, who has been principal of the Coquille high school for the past three years, has been elected instructor in science in the Marshfield high school at a salary of \$1200 per year. There is probably no stronger science teacher in Oregon than Mr. Robertson, and he will prove a valuable addition to the teaching force of the Bay city. During his connection with the local school the science work done here has been recognized as the best in the county."
