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**FRANK S. GRANT**  
For Attorney General

The Attorney General should be a man of wide and varied experience in the civil law, as distinguished from the criminal law. Mr. Grant has had that experience as City Attorney of Portland. The Attorney General should be a broad-minded man who can view a question from every angle; a man of judicial temperament and sound judgment and one who has had experience in handling big questions involving the civil rights of the state. As City Attorney of Portland Mr. Grant displayed the sound judgment, judicial temperament and broad mindedness which are so essential in the Attorney General, and he handled with ability, matters of the greatest importance to the city.

The Attorney General has very little power in enforcing the law (criminal) of the state. These laws, including the liquor laws, are enforced by the various district attorneys and the Attorney General cannot prosecute for violation of these laws.

Frank Grant, however, believes in law enforcement, as his record in enforcing the criminal ordinances of the city shows.

Mr. Grant's only promise is that he will, if elected, render to the state the same honest and efficient service he rendered the city of Portland.—(Paid. Adv.)
