NORTH BEND WINS 5 TO 4

Over 400 Fans See 11 Inning Game—Want Strong Organization

North Bend defeated Marshfield yesterday by a score of 5 to 4 in an eleven inning game played at North Bend. Horn brought in the winning run. Others who scored for North Bend were Hogan, Morse, Horn and Osborne. Those who crossed the plate for the local nine were Chandler, Burke, Krause and Lewis. Horn and Osborne were the batteries for North Bend, while Lewis, Krause and Kelly did the strenuous work for Marshfield. Kelly replaced Krause in the sixth inning.

The decisions of the umpire, Walter Gilbert, of North Bend, were severely criticized throughout the game. When McDonald, of North Bend, made a slide for the home plate in the tenth inning Gilbert declared him out. The decision brought forth a roar from the grandstand, many thinking him safe. Several close plays were made and there was a difference of opinion as to the decision of the umpire. About 400 fans witnessed the game.

Many of the local baseball enthusiasts deplore the lack of organization in baseball circles. They declare things are not running as smooth as they did last season. No admission was charged at the gate at yesterday's game, but a collection was taken up some time after the eighth inning. The fans contributed liberally and something like \$25 was collected which went to defray expenses.

It is contended by many that it is the better plan to raise money by popular subscription. The fair-minded do not believe in charging gate admission to see a poor game. The plan exercised yesterday was considered fair enough, no fan was compelled to pay, but the loyal supporters of baseball did not hesitate to go down in their jeans when the hat was passed.

Some of the ladies suggested that a cleaner grandstand would be more inviting. The floor and seats were littered with dirt, dust and old peanut shells.

It is understood that Krause and Kelly, who played with the local team yesterday will go to Coquille today or tomorrow.
