FEEBLE OLD LADY FOUND

Mrs. Mary Foster, Aged 61, Wanders to Eastside—Son Overdue From Portland

Mrs. Mary Foster, a gray-haired and feeble old lady, is at the boarding house conducted by Mrs. Emma Johnson at 236 Market street, where she is anxiously awaiting the arrival of her son Willie Foster and his wife, who left Portland on a motorcycle last Sunday.

Mrs. Foster, who is past sixty-one years of age, arrived on the Breakwater Saturday after making the trip from Portland unaccompanied. She wandered about the streets here for some time Saturday and then took the ferry to Eastside, where she was found sitting on a street curb by Mrs. Martin Breen.

A short talk with the old lady convinced Mrs. Breen that she was in need of help and Mrs. Breen called Mrs. Charles E. Olsen, whom she saw not far away. Mrs. Olsen took the old lady to her home and cared for her overnight. Sunday morning Miss Nellie Olsen, daughter of Mrs. Charles Olsen, made arrangements with Mrs. Johnson to take care of Mrs. Foster until the arrival of her son.

Speaks Broken English.
Mrs. Foster, who speaks in broken English, this morning told a reporter for The Times that she was born in Denmark and that she came to the United States when she was twelve years old. She said that for the past four years she had been living with her son in Portland. Previous to that time they had lived in South Dakota.

Mrs. Foster said that her son and daughter-in-law accompanied her to the Breakwater dock in Portland and saw her safely aboard the vessel. She says her son told her when they parted that he, with his wife, would make the trip to Marshfield by motorcycle and that they would probably arrive about the same time that she did.

According to the old lady her son is a roofer and expects to follow his trade in Marshfield. She has some baggage at the Breakwater dock, where it will be left until called for by her son.
