## Worthy of Election

AMONG the candidates for the Supreme bench are two who should receive the vote of every Republican in Southern Oregon. They are Lawrence T. Harris, of Eugene, and the present Justice Charles L. McNary, the youngest member of the court as now constituted.

Judge Harris of Eugene ranks high in the legal fraternity. His work on the circuit bench has been such as to warrant public approval in elevation to the higher court.

Judge McNary has proved his ability as a jurist during his occupancy of the bench.

He strives to brush aside the verbiage of technicalities, to make a court of law also a court of justice. His ideas are embodied in a recent dissenting opinion he filed in the case of State vs. Start, as follows:

The value of law is its proximity to reason, its certainty and universality. The two latter elements are the support of the rule known as stare decisis—to abide by decided cases. The abuses in the administration of law is to adhere blindly to a rule that savors of iniquity simply because it is a judicial decision. The first duty of a court is to decide the law correctly so far as it lies within the human mind. The next duty is to smite that rule of human action which is found to be unjust, however well it may be buttressed by precedent. Great reluctance to overthrow an established doctrine would naturally proceed from an established rule where property rights or individual liberty were at stake; but, where neither one nor the other of these long-respected rights have been entrenched by reason of judicial utterance, no hesitation should deter one from uprooting that rule which he believes to be subversive of common justice.

Judge McNary here sets forth the view of the average layman and it is of great importance that a justice holding the views of the "court of last resort," the people, be kept upon the bench he honors. As, in addition, he is familiar with the needs of southern Oregon, he should receive the solid Republican vote.

## For County Commissioner

IT IS by the selection of men of efficiency that relief from higher taxes may be hoped for. In this respect Republican voters have an opportunity to do effective work by voting for Thomas B. James in the primaries on Friday.

## TO MINE COAL BY MACHINERY

Smith-Powers Mine to Utilize Compressed Air Machines to Increase Output

Machinery will soon be installed in the Smith-Powers mine at Henryville which largely increases its output and will probably revolutionize coal mining in this section. The Sullivan Machinery Company now has the orders for the machines and will probably get them here soon.

Four machines are to be put in to mine the coal, compressed air being used for the purpose. The machines will saw out the coal in huge chunks, eliminating much of the waste that results from the coal being broken up by picks in mining it in the old way.

The four machines will probably take out between 200 and 300 tons per day where under the present system of mining only about 100 tons are taken out. Under the new system the miners will only have to break up the large chunks enough to load them on cars.

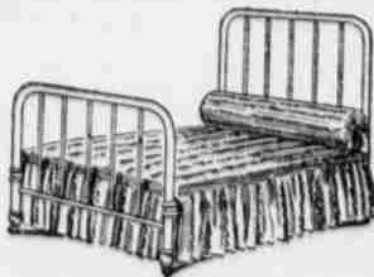
By utilizing compressed air, the danger of electric mining will be eliminated and it is claimed that the compressed air will also eliminate much of the gas dangers that are now encountered in the ordinary mines.
