ROTTED PLANK INJURES TWO

Mrs. Jas. Kellond Injured by Alleged Defective Plank in Broadway Sidewalk

A loose plank in the sidewalk on Broadway between Commercial and Market avenues, resulted in the serious injury of Mrs. James Kellond, and the slight injury of Mrs. E. W. Sullivan yesterday afternoon, when they fell through the rotted planking and were seriously injured internally.
 The ladies were walking toward Market avenue about 3 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, when suddenly Mrs. Kellond sank through a plank and was almost rendered unconscious. Mrs. Sullivan summoned an automobile, but on its arrival, Mrs. Kellond was unable to raise her foot to enter the machine.
 She was assisted in walking to the Lloyd Hotel, where she was attended to by Dr. Horafall, who pronounced the case a serious one, as the internal injuries might cause gangrene. The exact extent of Mrs. Kellond's injuries will not be known for some time.
