Tomorrow is Primary Election Day

ELECTION IN COQUILLE.

Mayor Morrison Re-elected by Two to One Vote.

In the Coquille city election 394 votes were cast for mayor. A large number of ladies exercised the franchise, and the polling place in the council chamber at the city hall looked as though some sort of a social function were being pulled off. The vote tallied up as follows:

For mayor—A. T. Morrison, 284; J. E. Quick, 110.

For Councilmen—W. H. Lyons, 330; C. I. Kime, 349; Geo. O. Leach, 290; J. E. Noel, 68; S. L. Curry, 67; H. DeJersey, 28; scattering, 4.

For Recorder—J. S. Lawrence, 359; J. H. James, 31.

The successful candidates were on the Citizen's Ticket nominated at the caucus; the others were the Socialist candidates.

The proposition to vacate the street and alleys in the proposed school site in the Barrow & Strang addition was defeated by a vote of 157 yes and 184 no.

The amendment to the city charter correcting a clerical error was ad-

opted by a vote of 227, only eighty-eight individuals being contrary enough to vote against it.

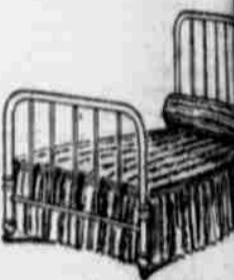
