Build Wharf—E. J. Loney, who came up from Port Orford yesterday states that at a meeting of the Commercial Club there \$5000 was raised with which to rebuild the wharf which was destroyed by the storm last winter. Mr. Loney first figured on putting in a cable system for handling his ties but this would not serve the city generally and finally it was agreed, when the McLeay estate decided not to build at present, to build. Mr. Loney and his companies took \$1250 worth of stock and other leading citizens, including Messrs. Knapp, Fromme, Marsh and McKenzie took the bulk of the balance. It is estimated that only about \$5400 will be required to build the wharf. Mr. Loney will handle his ties over it this year and will pay good returns on the investment.
