TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

GIVE UP ARMS.

Large Number of Guns Turned Over to U. S. Troops in Colorado.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

TRINIDAD, Colo., May 14.—The proclamation of disarmament issued by Colonel Lockhart by the authority of the War Department went into effect yesterday and dominated today the strike districts of Las Animas and Huerfano counties. The effect of the proclamation was evidenced by the turning in of hundreds of weapons.

ENGAGE IN FIST FIGHT.

Bryan's Confidential Secretary in Clash with Conner.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 14.—Jacob E. Conner, who was dismissed as consul at St. Petersburg, and Frank N. Bauskett, Secretary Bryan's confidential clerk, engaged in a fist fight in Bryan's offices. Conner objected being delayed in seeing Bryan in regard to his dismissal. The combatants were separated after Conner's cheek was cut and Bauskett's nose bruised.

ABANDON RURAL CREDIT

President to Abide by Democratic Caucus.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 14.—President Wilson will abide by the Democratic caucus in abandoning rural credits legislation at this session of the legislature. Representative Glass, chairman of the Banking and Currency committee, conferred with the President and explained that, in his opinion, the federal reserve bank act will extend credit aggregating \$500,000,000 on farm lands.

This will, in a measure, cover the ground for which the rural credits act is designed. Moreover the rural credits bill framed by Representative Bulkley is not broad enough in its provisions to satisfy the committee. The President especially desires the act should extend credit to tenant farmers.

FAVORS MEXICAN LIGHT KEEPERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 14.—"We should be very glad to have the Mexican light keepers return and take charge of the light at Lobos Island," said Sec. Bryan, when an inquiry was made concerning the latest phase of the situation growing out of the landing of American forces there.

CHARGES MADE AGAINST MAJOR

Colorado Militia Head Faces Blame for Many Casualties.

DENVER, Colo., May 14.—Charges of arson, murder, manslaughter and larceny against Major Patrick J. Hamrock of the Colorado militia were filed before the general court martial. The charges grew out of the Ludlow battle.

Major Hamrock said he did not care for counsel and was ready to proceed to trial immediately.

USE WAR AEROPLANES.

General Obregon Has Bombs Dropped into Mazatlan by Aviators.

ABOARD U. S. S. CALIFORNIA. (Wireless), May 14.—General Obregon's aviators became effective again in the battle waged for many days at Mazatlan. An aeroplane, circling above the intrenchments, dropped bombs into the fortifications today.

FAIRNESS OF PAPERS.

Reckless Editors and Reporters Bane of Newspaper Man's Life.

LAWRENCE, Kans., May 14.—The honest newspaper men of the country are in danger from reckless editors and reporters who habitually distort the truth, Isaac D. White of the New York World told the editors at the National Newspaper Conference. "Freedom of the press is freedom to do what the law permits," he said. "Four words, 'accuracy and fair play' sum up the law of journalism, just as the Golden Rule embraces the ten commandments."

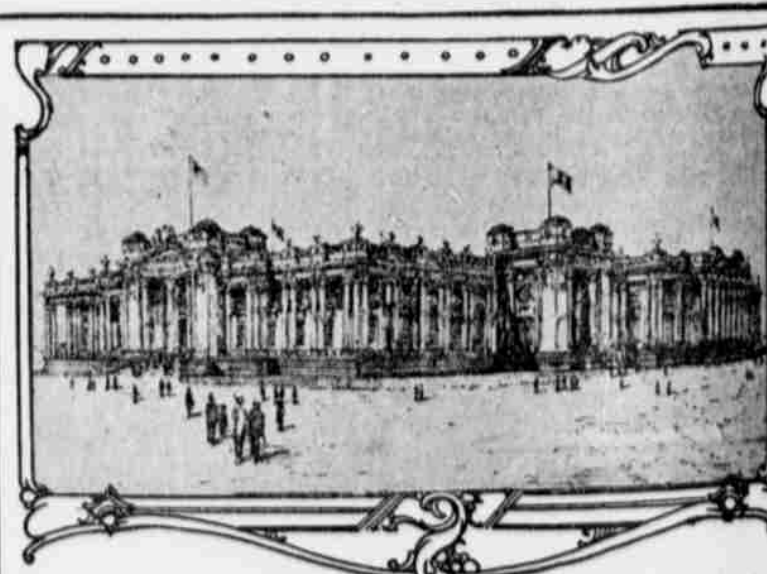

CANADA AT THE PANAMA-PACIFIC INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION, SAN FRANCISCO, 1915.

PLANS for the Canadian building at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition at San Francisco in 1915 have been approved, and the work on the great structure has started.

The Canadian Palace, as it is officially named, will be one of the largest and most imposing of the foreign buildings, having a length of 340 feet, a width of 240 feet and a height of 50 feet, and will cost in the neighborhood of \$300,000. It will be the largest building ever erected by Canada at an international exposition, covering 65,000 square feet, and will house one of the most elaborate and comprehensive exhibits of the Dominion's resources and products ever shown on foreign soil. Six hundred thousand dollars has already been voted by the Canadian parliament for the building and exhibits, but a further grant, bringing the appropriation up to \$1,000,000, will be recommended.
