Marshfield Man Honored at
State Convention of the
Knight of Columbus.

For a second term, William P. O'Brien, of Astoria, was elected state deputy of the Knights of Columbus in Oregon at the annual state council. A. A. Mickle, of Albany, was elected state secretary, succeeding Joseph F. Franzwa, of Eugene, who has held the position four years. Martin B. Donahue, of LaGrande, was elected state treasurer, succeeding E. P. Noonan, of Astoria, occupant of the office four years. John W. Kelly, of Portland succeeded Frank J. Longman as state advocate, and Hugh McLain, of Coos Bay, was re-elected warden, a position he has held since the state council was organized. Rev. E. V. O'Hara, of Portland, was selected for a second term as state chaplain. Delegates to the supreme council, to meet in Detroit, are W. P. O'Brien and Rodger B. Sinnott, with H. J. Maier, of The Dalles, as alternate.

Among the resolutions adopted was one recommending to all 13 subordinate councils of the state that a per capita assessment of 35 cents be levied for the education of seminarians. This resolution is in accord with the policy the Knights have pursued along educational lines for several years. Another resolution recommends that subordinate councils subscribe for periodicals which make a specialty of answering anti-Catholic attacks and send these publications into districts where the anti-Catholic papers are distributed.
The annual reports show that the membership in Oregon consists of 1400 members in good standing and that there has been a substantial increase in the past year, with the prospect of a new council being instituted at Salem during the next few weeks under the direction of District Deputy William Barrett, of Albany.

MILO SUMNER
IS WINNER

In Closely Contested W. C. T.
U. Demorest Contest, Silver Medal Is Awarded.

Milo Sumner was awarded the last of a series of silver medals presented by the local W. C. T. U. at Bunker Hill on Saturday evening. Mr. Sumner, in the judges estimation, won by 1-12, his percentage being 47 1-4 and that of the next speaker 47 1-16, the closest contest yet held.

This being the last silver medal contest, a contest will be held for a gold medal in Marshfield in June, in which the contestants who have been awarded silver medals will compete for the gold medal.

Lee Byerly, Miss Evelyn Langworthy, Miss Frances Franke, Leslie Isaacson, Milo Sumner and Dr. Mattie B. Shaw are some of the likely contestants for the gold medal, all having won silver medals. The speakers for the gold medal contest will be trained by Mrs. Rebecca Luse Stump, who has also prepared all the speakers in previous contests. Music at the Bunker Hill contest was given by courtesy of Miss Ursula Farringer and her numbers were well received by a large and enthusiastic audience.

The judges were Mrs. Ora McCarty, George Doll and Mrs. Cull. There was some mixup in the marking of the standings that caused considerable discussion, as the audience and two of the judges felt that Mrs. G. LeRoy Hall was entitled to the medal instead of Mr. Sumner. However, the mistake was not corrected and Mr. Sumner was allowed to keep the medal.

Former Coos County Musical
'Genius' in Travels in Europe

FRANK A. WICKMAN, FORMERLY OF MARSHFIELD, WRITES INTERESTING LETTER OF HIS EXPERIENCES IN THE OLD WORLD.

The Times is in receipt of the following letter from Milan, Italy, from Frank A. Wickman, a former Marshfield young man who has gained fame in musical circles at Berkeley California, and who has been spending the past year in Europe perfecting his musical education:

"Many times I have wanted to write you for your paper, but kept putting it off, as one is so apt to do when very busy. Hope you attend to the matter at once. If you do not want to send the paper before receiving the amount of the subscription, let me hear from you, and the amount will be forthcoming at once. Even though it is many years since I left Coos Bay, I am anxious to keep in touch with conditions there.

"At present I am enjoying a few weeks' vacation, devoting it to travel. A friend (from San Francisco) and I left Berlin the latter part of March, going to Paris and from there to the Riviera, Nice, Monte Carlo, Cannes and Mentone were very delightful, especially the glorious sunshine, as we left Berlin in a raging snowstorm. From the Riviera we went on to Genoa, Pisa and as far south as Rome. Home is at its best just before the Easter holidays, so we saw it at its best. Rome we came north to Florence and then on to Venice. Venice with a full moon and a clear night, as it was last night, is a never-to-be-forgotten fairyland. I was there last year in May during full moon and am hoping I may be fortunate to be there again some times in the future. Built on 117 small islands, intersected by over 150 canals, which are spanned by over 300 bridges, the effect from a gondola is easily imagined. We came up to Milan this afternoon and will spend tomorrow getting acquainted with its world-famed cathedral and its many celebrated art works, chief among which is Leonardo de Vinci's 'Last Supper.' From here we return to Berlin by way of the chief cities of Switzerland and southern Germany. I will then resume my studies until July, when I leave for a tour of Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland

and Russia. Having motored, last year, through Germany, Austria, Italy, France, Switzerland, England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales, and having a previous acquaintance with Holland and Belgium, when I return to America, which I expect to do in 1915, I will have a fair knowledge of Europe. From a scenic standpoint, America compares more than favorably with the much advertised attractions of Europe. I have yet to see anything that can compare with Yosemite Valley. In dealing with art and antiquity Europe is a veritable storehouse of delight and wonder. Italy leads them all from the historian's and antiquarian's standpoint.

GIRL IS FOUND
