**YACHT RACES COST HEAVILY**

NEW YORK, May 18, 1914.—  
 Some idea in the amount of money  
 involved in the defense of the Amer-  
 ican's Cup in the coming interna-  
 tional yacht regatta off Sandy Hook  
 in September may be gained from the  
 assertion recently made by an au-  
 thority who stated that twenty-two  
 American yachtsmen will spend more  
 than half a million dollars this sum-  
 mer in defending the trophy. In ad-  
 dition to the expense of prepar-  
 ing for the trial races it will cost  
 \$10,000 or \$15,000 more to bring  
 the defender through the cup races.  
 Alexander Smith Cochran of New  
 York will be under the heaviest out-  
 lay since as sole owner it will re-  
 quire close to \$200,000 to pay for  
 the building, fitting out and sailing  
 the Vanitie, now rapidly nearing com-  
 pletion at Neponset. Six present and  
 past flag officers of the New York  
 Yacht Club have given an unlimited  
 order to the designer, builder and  
 manager of the Resolute, the Bristol  
 production, and will probably be  
 called upon to contribute between  
 \$35,000 and \$40,000 each by the  
 time the season is finished. This  
 syndicate is composed of Vice Com-  
 modore George F. Baker, Jr., Rear  
 Commodore J. P. Morgan, former  
 Commodore Fredrick G. Bourne, Cor-  
 nellius Vanderbilt, Arthur Curtis  
 James, and former Vice Commodore  
 Henry Walters. It is estimated that  
 \$200,000 will be required to build  
 outfit and campaign the Resolute  
 during June, July and August. Of  
 the fifteen yachtsmen who combin-  
 ed to build the Defiance at Bath at  
 an estimated expense of \$100,000  
 eight are from Boston, six from New  
 York and one from Philadelphia.  
 The syndicate is composed of F. C.  
 Fletcher, E. S. Webster, Elliot Wad-  
 worth, Charles Hayden, F. E. Pea-  
 body, J. C. Cobb, Oliver Ames, and  
 Henry Taggard of Boston; Geo.  
 M. Pynchon, George Lauder, George  
 D. Barron, James B. Ford, E. Trow-  
 bridge Hall, and Thomas C. Dunham  
 of New York, and E. Walter Clark  
 of Philadelphia.  
 The exact sums paid to the Her-  
 renschoff Company for the last five  
 cup yachts, including the Constitu-  
 tion, have never been revealed, but  
 other builders believe that they know
