Skating Step In the Maxixe

THIS is considered by many the prettiest step in the Maxixe. Starting from the position shown in the picture, step forward with the left foot, touching the heel to the floor. Follow up with the right foot in the regular Maxixe step; then repeat on the other side, making a deep sliding dip on the second count. It must be remembered that the dip comes only when doing the right hand step and is on the second count. The left step is an ordinary Maxixe straightaway.

An easy and graceful recovery following the dip must be acquired, as an ugly position in this part of the movement will spoil the whole effect of the dance.
