# ELECTRICITY AT RANCH HOME

## A. O. Rogers Installs Plant to Light His South Coos River Place

Anson O. Rogers has just completed installing an electric light plant on his South Coos River ranch. It is the first ranch in Coos County to be fitted with an electric light plant of its own. Mr. Rogers put in a Fairbanks-Morse engine and has a dynamo that will generate ample electricity for his house and barn. About fifty lights have already been connected with it. This improvement, with the water system he has installed, makes his one of the foremost ranches in Coos County. Mr. Rogers is one of the most progressive men in the section and feels that there is no reason why the farm should not enjoy modern utilities as well as the towns.
