

NOTED SOLDIER DIES IN EAST

**Brigadier General Catterson,
Uncle of Mrs. Jas. Bennett,
of Marshfield, Is Dead**

Mrs. Jas. Bennett of Marshfield has just received word of the death of her uncle, Brigadier General Robert F. Catterson, the last surviving brigadier of Sherman's march to the sea. A Minneapolis paper contains the following:

"The funeral of Brigadier General Robert F. Catterson, formerly of Minneapolis, and one of the most brilliant officers of the Civil War, was held yesterday at San Antonio, Texas, where he removed in 1910.

The passing of General Catterson, it is believed, leaves no brigade commander who made the march with Sherman to the sea alive. Only a few days ago, General Robert Adams of this city, a comrade, died.

"General Catterson rose rapidly after his enlistment in 1861 as a private in the 14th Indiana Infantry. In a year he became a captain and in six months more a colonel. He had arisen to the command of a brigade when Sherman's march was made. At the close of the war he was made a brigadier general for distinguished and meritorious services.

"Participating in 41 battles, General Catterson was wounded five times, once so severely that he was sent home for treatment.

Surviving him are his widow at San Antonio, and two daughters, Mrs. E. W. Penny, of Minneapolis and Mrs. E. H. Moody of San Antonio."
