**WILL IRRIGATE RIVER RANCH**

**James Nowlin, of North Coos Plans to Make His Ranch Even More Productful**

James Nowlin of North Coos River was a Marshfield business visitor today, bringing in a consignment of vegetables, etc. Mr. Nowlin is one of the best truck ranchers in this section and is now arranging to make his ranch more productful. He is planning to put in an engine to pump water from Coos River to irrigate his ranch. Whether he will use regular irrigation ditches or a spray system he has not determined. He has demonstrated that intensive farming pays. He says that his best moneymaker is lettuce, raising four big crops that bring over \$200 per year off an area about as big as a good-sized room. He also raises fine strawberries and with the irrigating system expects to do much better.

**Broke Main**—Yesterday afternoon an embankment near the Coos Bay Water Company's reservoir slid down the hillside, ripping out the water main to town. It caused the water to be shut off an hour or two and also wasted considerable water.

**HIT BY LIGHTNING.**

**Coquille Valley Men Stunned and Houses Damaged by Lightning.**

The Coquille Sentinel says: Thursday evening's electrical storm which didn't touch us here at Coquille except as a vivid display in the eastern skies, hit pretty hard at Gravel Ford. Mr. Krantz, who was down from there this morning, says that two men were stunned by lightning there, one of whom, Joseph Young, had not yet regained consciousness this morning. He saw the lightning strike at three places in the woods and kindle a fire each time. Besides, the rainfall was the heaviest he ever saw there.
