DRUG LAWS TO BE RIGID NOW

President J. Lee Brown, of Oregon State Pharmacy Board, Returns Home

J. Lee Brown returned Saturday via the old Coos Bay wagon road from Salem, where he attended a meeting of the Oregon State Board of Pharmacy, of which he is president. The board has taken initial steps in a crusade against druggists who are violating the liquor law. Mr. Brown has revoked the license of one druggist and under a resolution just passed will refuse to renew the licenses of two others.

The Oregon Board of Pharmacy at a special meeting held at Salem on the 19th, passed the following resolution:

Whereas, it is the sense of this board that only those who show a proper respect for the laws of this state should be permitted to practice pharmacy therein,

Be it ordered that no person shall be examined, or renewal issued as a registered pharmacist or assistant pharmacist, who, between January 1, 1911, and the date of application for examination or renewal, shall have been convicted of two or more violations of any state or Federal law governing the sale of narcotic drugs or intoxicating liquors, and,

Be it further resolved, that if, upon investigation by the board, it is found that anyone who is a licentiate of this board persistently engages in the sale of narcotic drugs or intoxicating liquors in violation of law the board will, in its discretion, refuse to grant renewal or to examine any applicant for registration, although the applicant may not have been twice convicted as above provided.
