HOUSE GIVEN TO DR. STRAW

Marshfield Citizens Will Present Ex-Mayor Fine Home in Appreciation of Services.

Ex-Mayor E. E. Straw and Mrs. Straw were very much surprised last Saturday on being informed that some of the taxpayers in Marshfield had understood that they contemplated building a bungalow on their lots in Marshfield, the cost of which had been estimated, and that the money to construct the house had been contributed by some of the taxpayers. The citizens got together and feeling that the services which ex-Mayor Straw had rendered for the city of Marshfield during his eight years in office, without compensation, ought to be recognized in some way, by those who got the fruits of his labors. As has been done in the Admiral Dewey case on a larger scale the people here were joining in a small way, and the money is procured to construct the house which will be turned over to Dr. and Mrs. Straw.

Dr. Straw said in his characteristic way that the people of Marshfield did not owe him anything and he did not want any passing of hats for his services, although he did feel that their offering to do this was indeed a very great compliment and he appreciated it very highly, but said, however, that he would have to consult Mrs. Straw and leave the matter to her judgment, which was done later.

At all events, it is the intention of those contributing to the fund to go on and construct the house, and turn it over to him, just as the people of the United States did with Admiral Dewey, and it is believed that Marshfield will have the distinction of being the first city in the state to thus reward an ex-mayor who worked without salary for his services.

No list of the contributors was kept or given out, but it is stated that it includes practically all of the larger property owners in the city.

BIG VICTORY IN FIELD MEET

Marshfield High School Won More Points Than Competitors Combined Saturday.

MYRTLE POINT, Or., May 25.—Marshfield scored more points than all other teams combined in the Coos county high school field meet here Saturday.

Sidney Clarke of Marshfield scored enough points to have tied for first place, winning twenty-five. Henry Lecocq, also of Marshfield, was second with seventeen and Miller of Myrtle Point third with fifteen.

New Coos county records made by Lecocq in doing the mile run in 5:05; Clarke in the 220 yard dash in 22 1-2 and in the 220 yard hurdles in 27 4-5.

The marks made in the javelin and discus throwing will also stand as county records, this being the first year these events have been included in the meet.

The records were broken in the jumps, as the runway was in poor condition and the boys could not get a good take off. For this reason Clarke did not try to better his record of five feet nine inches in the high jump and Watters did not attempt to beat the mark of 9 feet 9 inches in the pole vault.

Miller of Myrtle Point won all firsts in the weight events.

Conditions Unfavorable.
The track was slow and heavy and a cold head wind bothered the runners. Clarke won the short distances with ease. Lecocq defeated Harvey very handily in the mile and Bach came in with a spurt which very nearly landed him a second. Last year there was a dispute as to who should have been declared the winner in the mile, some contending that Harvey, who won by a yard after being coached on the finish, should have been disqualified. Lecocq proved himself to be the best man this year and thereby settled the dispute.

Watters of North Bend won the pole vault, which was the only place won by his team. Simpson, who was a sure point winner, was unable to enter on account of illness.

Miller of Coquille won the 440 and Lawrence made a good showing in the 100 and 220.

In the century some had expected Clarke to hang up a new record, but he got a poor start and also had a stout wind to buck against.

There was a good crowd out. W. G. Chandler acted as starter. Professors Tiedren, Grannis, Grubbs, Parks, Raab, Robertson, Hopkins and Messrs. Sparks and Moland were among the officials in charge.

Negotiations are still on between the local managers and the managers of the Coquille and Bandon teams and a definite schedule for the season is being formulated.

The Elks and the North Bend firemen will also meet next Sunday on the North Bend diamond.

WHISKEY HERE IS DIFFERENT

Habitual Drinker Says He is Never Arrested Anywhere Except Marshfield

There is a different tang in the whiskey in Marshfield, according to Alfred Johnson, who was given a hearing before Recorder Butler this morning after spending the night in the Hotel de Carter. Johnson was arrested at 12:30 this morning when Officer Doane found him on the street in a drunken condition. Johnson says that he never gets drunk on the whiskey anywhere except Marshfield and then he invariably gets arrested.

Ed McDonald, aged 71, who for the second time this week has been arrested on a charge of drunkenness, also had a hearing this morning before Recorder Butler. McDonald was arrested by Marshal Carter yesterday morning. He was so drunk at the time that he can't remember who arrested him. Carter says that McDonald was taking up the whole sidewalk and then some. McDonald said that if an officer would pilot him out of the city he would go to work but that as long as he remained in town he was apt to patronize the saloons.

Nick Delich was found on the Alliance dock at 1:40 p. m. yesterday by Marshal Carter. He said that he had walked the distance of twenty-five miles from a logging camp and that he was tired. He admitted having taken a little drink. When he was brought before Recorder Butler this morning he said that he came to

the city to find a man named John Delleh, who, he claimed, owed him \$50. John Delleh, he said, was no relative of his. The customary fine of \$5 was tied to each of the offenders. They were warned that if found on the streets in a drunken condition again the penalty would be more severe. The three men promised to go to work as soon as they could find something to do.
