LUMBER GIVES WORK TO MANY

Over 735,000 Employed in Industry in United States—U. S. Statistics.

Washington, D. C., May 26.—Striking facts regarding our forest resources, their value and their waste, are condensed in an eight-page illustrated circular of the American forestry association just issued. The lumber industry is said to employ 735,000 people, to whom are paid annually \$367,000,000 in wages, the worth of products being \$1,250,000,000. The forests of the country cover 550,000,000 acres.

An average of 70 human lives are sacrificed annually in forest fires says the circular, and a loss occurs of \$25,000,000. Damage from insects and tree diseases, which follow fire, costs each year \$50,000,000. The cost of destruction resulting from floods is not estimated, but is given as "countless millions."

But the circular expresses hope more than pessimism. The effective patrol here reduced "forest fire losses to as low as one-tenth of one cent an acre." It is pointed out that by planting forests an annual income could be derived in the country of \$65,000,000 and by preservative treatment upon timber each year \$100,000,000 could be saved.

STATE RESERVES RIGHT

Attorney General Rules on Privilege of Mining River Beds.

SALEM, Or., May 26.—That persons desiring to mine river beds in the state must apply to the State Land Board was an opinion rendered yesterday by Attorney-General Crawford at the instance of W. C. Hodges, of Los Angeles. While the mining laws provide that any person may take up as a claim any unappropriated part of the public domain, they do not apply to river beds, which are owned by the state and are not a part of the public domain.

The State Land Board has the exclusive right of disposing of state lands and the right to lease mineral lands. Mr. Hodges wrote in the interest of friends who desired to take up a mining claim in Rogue River. It is understood they intend mining for gold if they can obtain control of the river bed at a certain point which has not been divulged.

YAQUINA TRAFFIC OPENS

Schooner Bandon Resumes Service of 15 Years Ago.

NEWPORT, Or., May 26.—That the Marine commerce will be resumed between Yaquina Bay and San Francisco, after a lapse of 15 years, is assured by the coming of the steam schooner Bandon from San Francisco to load lumber at Toledo, where there is a large mill.

The Newport lifesaving crew, in charge of Captain Stuart, assisted the Bandon, which was piloted by Tracy Davis, who brought the Francis H. Leggett and Bandon in when they made one trip, in 1907, to force the buying or leasing of the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad by the Southern Pacific. The new channel at Toledo, 13 miles inland, on Depot Slough, just off the Yaquina River, has been completed recently by Government engineers. It is 11 feet deep at low tide and 100 feet wide, except at turns, where it is 200 feet.
